DETAILS OF INCIDENT:

At approximately 1650 hours, while supervising minors in the Dining Hall, I observed [REDACTED] run towards [REDACTED], who was seated at another table. Both minors fell to the floor. I responded from my position near the kitchen entrance door. I un-holstered my Oleoresin Capsicum spray and gave a verbal directive for the minors to stop. [REDACTED] then got up from his table and began striking [REDACTED] about the head area with closed fists. I deployed a one second burst of O.C. spray making contact with the right side of [REDACTED] face area. I deployed another one second burst of O.C. spray toward [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] moved his head causing the spray to make contact with the top part of his head. SJCO Diltz took hold of [REDACTED] right leg and began pulling him away from [REDACTED]. SJCO Diltz maintained control of [REDACTED] and I took control of [REDACTED] by placing both of my hands on his back. Both minors stopped struggling and complied.

JCO Wigley observed several minors stand up from their tables. She gave a verbal directive for the minors to get down on the ground. [REDACTED] and some of the other minors remained standing. JCO Wigley deployed a one second burst of O.C. spray and made contact with the center mass of [REDACTED] face. [REDACTED] and the other minors then complied and got down on the ground. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], F. began exchanging closed fist punches at each other's head area. JCO Wigley deployed a one second burst making contact with [REDACTED], [REDACTED] on the right side of his face area. She

then deployed another burst of O.C. spray making contact with [REDACTED] in the face area. Both minors continued to exchange blows. JCO Wigley placed [REDACTED], [REDACTED] in a bear hug and pulled him away from [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] and JCO Wigley fell backwards onto a table. JCO Wigley maintained her control hold and assisted [REDACTED] to the floor. [REDACTED] moved away from [REDACTED], F. and remained on the floor. All minors were assisted to their feet one at a time and placed in their rooms without further incident.

At 1708 hours, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], F. began their decontamination showers. They requested to end their shower at 1715 hours. As we continued decontamination showers SJCO Diltz determined each youth's severity to the reaction of the oleoresin capsicum spray. He then began sending youths to decontamination shower based upon his observations. At 1716 hours [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] complained of overspray and began their decontamination showers. [REDACTED] also started his decontamination shower at this time. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] also complained of overspray and began decontamination showers at 1717 hours. [REDACTED] began his shower at 1718 hours. At 1726 hours, [REDACTED], [REDACTED], [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] opted to end their decontamination showers. At 1727 hours, [REDACTED], [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] started decontamination showers. At 1742 hours all showers were completed.

I spoke with [REDACTED] about the incident. He stated he did not know why [REDACTED] attacked him. I observed a half inch cut to [REDACTED] right eyebrow area. I provided a band aid for the cut. He declined any further first aid.

I spoke with [REDACTED] about the incident and he stated he hit [REDACTED] because he kept running his mouth. [REDACTED] went on to say he fought [REDACTED], [REDACTED] because "he hit me." [REDACTED] did not complain of any injuries and I did not observe any obvious injuries on him.

[REDACTED] refused to speak with me about the incident. I did not observe any obvious injuries.

I spoke with [REDACTED], [REDACTED], and he stated he did not know why he fought [REDACTED]. I did not observe any obvious injuries.

I counseled with [REDACTED] regarding the incident and he stated [REDACTED], [REDACTED] hit me so I fought him. I did not observe any obvious injuries on [REDACTED].

DETAILS OF INCIDENT:

While supervising the youths in the Dining Hall, [REDACTED] was seated at the opposite table as [REDACTED] - [REDACTED]. Without warning, [REDACTED] stood up from his chair and began swinging close fist punches at [REDACTED] - [REDACTED] head and face area. [REDACTED] - [REDACTED] covered his face with both hands and fell to the floor. [REDACTED] stood over him and continued to throw closed fist punches at [REDACTED] - [REDACTED]. I unholstered my oleoresin capsicum spray and directed [REDACTED] to stop or I would spray. JOSEPH would not comply with my verbal directives. I sprayed a one second burst of oleoresin capsicum spray hitting [REDACTED] on his forehead. [REDACTED] continued hitting [REDACTED] - [REDACTED] and would not comply with my directives. I re-holstered my can of oleoresin capsicum spray and with my right hand grabbed the back of his head taking a hold of his hair and placing my left hand on his jumpsuit. I pulled him off away from [REDACTED] - [REDACTED] directing him to the floor. I transitioned my right hand from the back of his head to his right hand placing him into a rear wrist lock.

[REDACTED] became compliant at this time. As I began to help [REDACTED] to his feet, [REDACTED] began yelling at [REDACTED] - [REDACTED], "That's what you get you fucking drop out! JCO Wigley quickly moved over to the table [REDACTED] was seated at and verbally directed him to go inside. [REDACTED] got up slowly from his chair walking towards the door. [REDACTED] stopped and began shouting, "Su Norte Scrap!" JCO Wigley gave him another verbal directive to go inside, which he complied without any further verbal directives.

As I continued my hold of [REDACTED], JCO Wigley began escorting [REDACTED] to his room without further incident.

Once [REDACTED] was in his room, I helped [REDACTED] to his feet and escorted him to his room without further incident.

██████████ decontamination shower was started at 1641 hours. He completed his shower at 1650 hours.

I spoke with ██████████ after the incident. He stated, "I have nothing to say." I asked if he received any injuries and needed medical attention. He stated, "No, I don't." I did not observe any injuries.

I spoke with ██████████ - ██████████ concerning the incident. He stated he does not know what happened. I asked if he required any medical attention. He stated, "No, my right ear hurts a little bit." I did not observe any injuries to his right ear or other visible injuries. He was offered Ibuprofen which he accepted.

██████████ stated he was really angry about what had just happened. He doesn't know why he made the statements.

DETAILS OF INCIDENT:

At approximately 1648 hours, I was escorting the "C" unit youth to their rooms from the Dining Hall. I observed [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] facing each other exchanging heated words. [REDACTED] then punched [REDACTED] in the head area with a closed fist. [REDACTED] fell backwards onto the floor and [REDACTED] fell on top of [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] continued throwing blows as [REDACTED] attempted to cover his face area. I grabbed the back of [REDACTED] jumpsuit with both of my hands and pulled him off of [REDACTED] and on to the floor by Door 23. [REDACTED] stood up and moved against the wall.

I observed several youth from "C" unit standing in an aggressive stance near the altercation area. JCO Wigley unholstered her oleoresin capsicum spray and verbally directed the other youth to step back. The other youth complied. SJCO Diltz responded from the Dining Hall and assisted in placing the other youth in their rooms. SJCO Diltz returned and escorted [REDACTED] to his room without further incident.

I assisted [REDACTED] to his feet and escorted him to his room without further incident.

I counseled with [REDACTED] about the incident. He stated, [REDACTED] confronted him about calling him a name. [REDACTED] told him he didn't know what he was talking about and that is when [REDACTED] punched him. I observed a red area an inch in diameter on his left cheek. [REDACTED] went on to explain he had some pain in his right ankle from when he fell backwards. I asked him if he wanted an ice pack and he stated, "No."

I spoke with [REDACTED] about the incident. He stated he did not know what happened. I did not observe any obvious injuries on [REDACTED]. He declined any first aid.

DETAILS OF INCIDENT:

While supervising youth in the Back Day Room, I observed [REDACTED] without warning get up from his chair and run towards [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] stood up from his chair and both minors began exchanging closed fist punches at each other's face area. I quickly unholstered my Oleoresin Capsicum spray and directed both youth to stop. They continued exchanging punches. I sprayed a one second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum hitting [REDACTED] in the center mass of his face. [REDACTED] covered his eyes and fell to the ground. I sprayed another one second burst hitting [REDACTED] on the left eye and cheek. I reholstered my spray and took a hold of [REDACTED] by the back of his jumpsuit, pulling him away from [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] was cooperative as I continued to control the back of his jumpsuit. He was placed into his room without further incident.

[REDACTED] was assisted to his feet by JCO Ramos and escorted to his room without further incident.

At 1934 hours, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] began their decontamination shower. At 1948 hours, [REDACTED] was placed in his room and a five minute medical watch was begun. At 2001 hours, [REDACTED] was placed into his room and the five minute medical watch was also begun.

When speaking with [REDACTED] regarding the incident he stated, that he does not know why [REDACTED] attacked him. I asked if he required any medical attention and he stated he had a mild headache but did not require any first aid. While counseling with [REDACTED] I did not observe any obvious injuries to him.

I counseled with [REDACTED] about the incident, he stated that [REDACTED] was looking at him funny all day and that why he attacked him. While speaking with [REDACTED], I observed a small cut on his lower, and upper lip in addition to two small

cuts on his right hand that had reopened during the incident. He stated that he would like a few band aids for his hand, but refused any further first aid.

DETAILS OF INCIDENT:

Upon completion of dinner, I was escorting the youth housed on "D" Unit to their rooms. As we entered Door 23 [REDACTED] began talking loudly. I heard him say, "You better get that guy off my unit." I instructed [REDACTED] to be quiet and continue towards his room. [REDACTED] continued making aggressive comments to [REDACTED]. We arrived at the carpeted area of the Back Day Room. In an attempt to deescalate the situation, I instructed [REDACTED] to stop walking and stand next to me. [REDACTED] complied and did not engage [REDACTED]. I directed the other youth, including [REDACTED], to continue to their rooms with Extra Hire Juvenile Corrections Officer Alvarado. [REDACTED] turned towards [REDACTED] and pulled open the snaps of his jumpsuit. [REDACTED] then challenged [REDACTED] to fight. I un-holstered my Oleoresin Capsicum Spray and informed [REDACTED] if he swings at [REDACTED] would spray him. [REDACTED] continued to challenge [REDACTED] and took three steps forward. I raised my hand and aimed my Oleoresin Capsicum canister toward [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] stopped advancing but continued verbally challenging [REDACTED]. EHJCO Alvarado took control of [REDACTED] by taking hold of his jumpsuit and escorted him to his room. Once placed in his room, [REDACTED] continued to threaten to fight [REDACTED].

I spoke with [REDACTED] about why he became so angry at [REDACTED]. He explained it was because [REDACTED] kept glaring at him in the Dining Hall. [REDACTED] further stated that he had heard him "talking shit." I counseled with [REDACTED] about the importance of learning to control his outbursts. He was receptive to counseling.

I gave verbal commands to [REDACTED] to stop, however [REDACTED] ignored my commands. I un-holstered my oleoresin capsicum spray and directed [REDACTED] to stop again and he continued to throw closed handed fists to [REDACTED]'s facial area. I deployed a one second burst of oleoresin capsicum spray to [REDACTED]'s facial area.

[REDACTED] immediately stopped striking [REDACTED] and covered his face with his arms. [REDACTED] stepped away from [REDACTED]. I directed [REDACTED] several times to walk to his room and he ignored my directives. Extra Help Juvenile Corrections Officer Crittenden approached [REDACTED] and directed him to walk to his room. [REDACTED] complied and was escorted by EHJCO Crittenden to his room. I escorted [REDACTED] to his room and directed him to rinse his face with water from his sink. [REDACTED] complied.

Doctor Cassady escorted [REDACTED] from his room to his office at approximately 0724 hours for treatment to his lip, which was bleeding. [REDACTED] was placed back in his room at 0740 hours.

[REDACTED] began his decontamination shower at 0725 hours with Juvenile Corrections Officer Ramos. [REDACTED] was placed back in his room at 0741 hours.



ADDENDUM


I spoke with **ALDRIDGE** at 1010 hours about the incident. He claimed there have been some "shit" talking going on, and felt it had caused the incident. I counseled with **ALDRIDGE** on avoiding such situations as they tend to escalate quickly, and may result in charges being filed. **ALDRIDGE** claimed that he wanted to avoid new charges as he wanted to get out the juvenile hall. I reminded him that his actions would dictate how long he stayed. **ALDRIDGE** appeared receptive to my counseling. As I spoke with him I observed a cut on his lower right lip, which had received one stitch. I asked if he had any other injuries which required first aid he replied, "No."

I spoke with **ZAVALA** at 1020 hours about the incident. He claimed that he did not know why it happened. I counseled **ZAVALA** at length regarding the seriousness nature of his actions, focusing on the possibility of him being charged as a result of his actions. During our conversation he informed me that he had been validated as a member of the Norteno gang by Supervising Juvenile Corrections Officer Wise at Yuba Gardens School. I asked **ZAVALA** if the incident had anything to do with his gang affiliation and he replied, "I don't know." **ZAVALA** asked me what gang enhancements meant. I explained to him that gang enhancements add extra time the sentence received for the crime committed. **ZAVALA** appeared to be receptive to my counseling. As I spoke with him I did not observe any injuries. When I asked if he had any injuries which required first aid he replied, "No."

DETAILS OF INCIDENT:

While supervising youth on E-Unit, I was in the process of getting the group up for open recreation. [REDACTED] was sitting by the long table in the middle of the room. As I opened [REDACTED] door, [REDACTED] got up and both youth began to run towards each other. Upon reaching each other, both youth began to throw closed fist punches at each other's faces. I directed both youth to stop or I would spray and called for backup. Both youth continued their assault on each other ignoring my verbal directive. I unholstered my oleoresin capsicum spray and proceeded to spray a short one second burst hitting [REDACTED] on the right side of her face. I sprayed another one second burst hitting [REDACTED] on the left side of her face. Both females continued to fight, grabbing each other's hair. I got in between both youth and pulled [REDACTED] by the top of her jumpsuit with my right hand as I pushed [REDACTED] away with my left hand. SJCO Romero arrived and both youth elected to stop fighting. SJCO Romero assisted [REDACTED] to her feet and placed her in her room without further incident. I continued to hold [REDACTED] by the back of her jumpsuit until [REDACTED] was placed in her room. I placed [REDACTED] in her room without further incident.

[REDACTED]'s decontamination shower began at 1536 hours and ended at 1543 hours. She said she was fine and wanted to go to her room refusing to finish her decontamination shower. [REDACTED]'s decontamination shower began at 1543 hours and ended at 1558 hours. She also elected to end her decontamination shower early. [REDACTED] asked if she could re-enter the shower because she still felt the effects of the oleoresin capsicum spray. [REDACTED] began to decontaminate again at 1558 hours and elected to end it at 1603 hours.

Prior to this incident [REDACTED] had asked for her lights to be turned off. Before I could respond, [REDACTED] interrupted telling her to quit asking for the light off. [REDACTED] told me, "You're not letting me have the light off because of that bitch." I explained to her we were required to keep the light on and it had nothing to do with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] ignored my explanation and began threatening to fight

[REDACTED] She was advised if she chose to do so, it could affect her current release date. [REDACTED] N replied, "I don't give a fuck."

When I talked to [REDACTED] about the incident, I asked her if she realized this incident could affect her current release date. She stated, "I am not tripping off that" and shrugged her shoulders. She did admit fighting over the light was dumb. When I tried to talk to her about better ways of handling the situation, she stated, "I would have fought the bitch any way, I don't like her." After this statement, [REDACTED] turned away from me and refused to continue with our conversation.

I talked to [REDACTED] who was more open to counseling. She admitted she should have let staff explain to [REDACTED] why the lights needed to stay on instead of telling her to quit asking. She agreed to let staff deal with situations which do not involve her. [REDACTED] also agreed to talk to staff when she is irritated.

While checking for injuries, I noticed a quarter size knot between [REDACTED] eyebrows. [REDACTED] was provided with an ice pack.

I observed five small scratches on the left side of [REDACTED] face, one about an inch long and the rest approximately half an inch long. Her face also had slight bruising on the left side. She also had a small dime size bruise above her left eye. [REDACTED] was offered first aid, but declined. Despite her refusal, [REDACTED] was provided with an icepack to prevent swelling.



DETAILS OF INCIDENT:

During breakfast, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] started to exchange verbal insults with each other. SJCO Parnow directed them to stop. All three youth ignored his order and continued. SJCO Parnow repeated his directions to the three youth and they ignored his directions again.

The two females were ordered to leave the dining hall and I directed them out to be escorted by JCO Chamberlain to their rooms. [REDACTED] continued to talk back to staff and ignored repeated directions to stop and be quiet. SJCO Parnow ordered [REDACTED] to leave the dining hall and I escorted him out.

As [REDACTED] entered the Back Day Room, he heard [REDACTED] talking as she was being lead to door six by JCO Chamberlain. He started yelling at her calling her a "bitch." I immediately told [REDACTED] to stop and he ignored my direction, while continuing to yell at [REDACTED]

I grabbed [REDACTED] by the collar of his jumpsuit with my right hand and continued to walk him to his room. [REDACTED] paused and turned in the direction of door six and continued to yell at [REDACTED]. I maintained control of [REDACTED] by holding the collar of his jumpsuit with my right hand and continued to walk him to his room. He was not fully compliant and had to be physically pushed in the direction of his room.

I heard JCO Chamberlain verbally inform me [REDACTED] was coming towards the back dayroom. As I turned toward the shower hallway I observed her approaching my location. I told her to stop and she ignored my directive and continued towards [REDACTED] yelling at him and raised both of her arms up in order to strike him.

I repeated my directions to [REDACTED] to stop and she ignored my directions again and physically was attempting to strike [REDACTED] with closed fists. [REDACTED] started to

step away from her and deflect her blows. I unholstered my Oleoresin Capsicum Spray and warned [REDACTED] if she did not stop I would spray her.

She continued towards [REDACTED] swinging both her arms at him. I released my hold on [REDACTED] and grabbed [REDACTED] by both of her arms, but she pulled away. At this time, I sprayed a one second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum spray towards [REDACTED]'s facial area. [REDACTED] continued to swing both arms yelling.

I holstered my Oleoresin Capsicum Spray and grabbed [REDACTED] with my right hand on her collar and left hand on her right hand restrained to the floor. [REDACTED] GE remained standing by his room during this quietly and not causing any issues.

EHJCO Carter arrived from the dining hall and escorted [REDACTED] to his room. Once [REDACTED] was placed in his room, EHJCO Carter took control of [REDACTED] with a rear wrist lock and assisted her to her feet and escorted her through door six. From door six, JCO Chamberlain escorted both females to E-Unit.

I counseled with [REDACTED] and explained to her that any actions by her can have consequences. She acknowledged understanding this and said in the future she would try to better control her actions. I asked if she was injured or needed medical attention and she said, "No." I did not observe any injuries on her. I asked what started the incident and she said they just started insulting each other in the dining hall.

I counseled with [REDACTED] explaining to him that his actions can have consequences. He acknowledged he was aware of this and said he would try harder to not get into trouble. I asked what started the incident and he said [REDACTED] threw the towel used for wiping down the dining hall tables hard at him striking him in the face. I asked if he was hurt and he said, "No." I asked if he needed medical attention, he said, "No." I did not observe any injuries on the youth.

As I completed counseling with [REDACTED] he informed me he received some pepper spray on him. I counseled [REDACTED] concerning the importance of notifying staff immediately concerning exposure to oleoresin capsicum. This was especially concerning as the incident occurred at 0741 hours and he was only now informing staff at approximately 0952 hours. [REDACTED]'s decontamination shower was started at 0954 hours and was completed at 1000 hours.

[REDACTED] immediately got to her feet and backed away from the situation.

I removed my Oleoresin Capsicum spray from its holster and gave a verbal command to stop fighting or I would spray. [REDACTED] EVANS looked up at me and moved away from the altercation. [REDACTED] LOZANO stopped striking [REDACTED] but did not move away from the altercation. [REDACTED] SCHOTT continued to strike [REDACTED]. I released a one second burst of O.C. spray towards [REDACTED] SCHOTT's face area. [REDACTED] SCHOTT ducked her head causing the spray to mostly make contact with her sweatshirt. [REDACTED] SCHOTT immediately stopped hitting [REDACTED]. I was able to take hold of [REDACTED] PULTON's right arm and assist her to her feet. JCO Nagra heard the commotion from the Dining Hall and responded to Door 23.

JCO Nagra remained on the B-unit corridor with [REDACTED] EVANS, SCHOTT, and [REDACTED] LOZANO while I escorted [REDACTED] PULTON to her room on E-unit. Once [REDACTED] PULTON was placed in her room, JCO Nagra escorted [REDACTED] EVANS, SCHOTT, and [REDACTED] LOZANO to E-unit and they were placed in their rooms without further incident.

I asked [REDACTED] if any of the O.C. spray had made contact with her skin and if she required a decontamination shower. [REDACTED] responded, "Yes." [REDACTED] spoke up from her room and stated she needed one as well. She explained she had received some overspray to her eye area. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]'s decontamination shower began at 1236 hours. As [REDACTED] entered the shower she yelled, "It's not over! I'm going to beat your ass!" [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] both opted to end their decontamination showers at 1241 hours. I encouraged them to remain in the shower for twenty minutes but they both chose to end the shower.

Once all the girls were in their rooms, I heard [REDACTED] yell out her door, "Scrap Bitch!"

I spoke with [REDACTED] about the incident and asked her why these girls would go after her. She stated she was just defending her friend, [REDACTED] felt [REDACTED] was being targeted by these girls because [REDACTED] is affiliated with Surenos. [REDACTED] was counseled by EHJCO McDonald about not getting involved in any altercation and it was explained to her that she needs to allow staff to handle the situation. I asked [REDACTED] if she had sustained any injuries and she stated, "No." I did not observe any obvious injuries.

I spoke with [REDACTED] about the altercation and asked her why she had attacked [REDACTED]. She smiled and said she did not know why. I asked her if she had any injuries and she stated, "No." I did not observe any obvious injuries.

I spoke with [REDACTED] and asked her why the altercation had happened. She stated she did not know why. I asked her if she had planned to attack [REDACTED]. She stated, "You already know." I asked [REDACTED] if she had any injuries and she stated, "No." I did not observe any obvious injuries.

She went on to say they had been harassing her throughout the week and she had been trying to keep clear of them. [REDACTED] stated that she did not know which girl had come up from behind her and pulled her hair causing her to fall to the ground. [REDACTED] stated after she fell [REDACTED] began punching and kicking her. She saw [REDACTED] raise her leg in what she thought was an attempt to stomp on her face. It was then that she noticed [REDACTED] come up and try to pull [REDACTED] off of her. I asked [REDACTED] if she had any injuries and she stated, "No." I did not observe any obvious injuries.





I then verbally directed [REDACTED] to sit down, he complied.

Once, everyone was sitting down and the group was under control, I directed JCO Heuvelhorst to escort [REDACTED] to his room. JCO Heuvelhorst walked [REDACTED] from the yard and was met by EHJCO Hernandez, who took control of [REDACTED] and placed him in his room.

At approximately 1509 hours, while supervising Large Muscle Exercise in the SHU yard, I observed a physical altercation between [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] begin in the southwest corner of the SHU yard. I gave verbal directives for them to disengage as I crossed the SHU yard. They ignored my verbal directives and continued striking each other with closed fist punches. I observed a second altercation begin. I focused on the altercation in front of me and JCO Heuvelhorst took control of the second altercation. I un-holstered my Oleoresin Capsicum and verbally directed them to disengage or I would deploy my Oleoresin Capsicum. Both minors continued to exchange punches. I deployed a 1 second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum hitting [REDACTED] on the left side of his face. Then I deployed a 1 second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum hitting [REDACTED] on the right side of his face. They moved closer toward each other and continued to strike each other with closed fist punches. I grabbed [REDACTED] by the arm of his jump suit with my left hand and pulled him away from [REDACTED]. As I directed [REDACTED] to the ground [REDACTED] engaged him by continuing the altercation on the ground. I gave continued verbal directives for the minors to disengage as I attempted to gain physical control of them. Due to the close proximity of the minors, their equal involvement in the altercation, and lack of compliance to stop fighting, I deployed another 1 second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum to each minor. I deployed toward [REDACTED] first as he was closer to my right hand side, then I deployed toward [REDACTED]. I hit [REDACTED] in the center mass of his face and I hit [REDACTED] on the bridge of his nose and in his right eye. [REDACTED] continued to strike [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] continued to strike [REDACTED]. I then used my body weight to gain control of the minors by placing my right elbow across [REDACTED] shoulders and my left knee across [REDACTED] back. I continued my verbal directives for them to disengage but

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both minors continued to attempt to strike the other. I shifted my body weight so I could re-holster my Oleoresin Capsicum and use my right hand to sweep [REDACTED]'s right hand into a rear wristlock. My attempt failed as [REDACTED] would not relinquish his arm. He continued to attempt to strike [REDACTED]. I remained in a prone position restraining both minors to the ground until backup arrived. I continued verbal directives to disengage while controlling their movements with use of my body weight.

DS Hungrige separated [REDACTED] from [REDACTED] by using a rear wristlock. DS Hungrige moved [REDACTED] approximately five yards away and placed him face down in a prone position continuing his rear wristlock. DS Hungrige then stood [REDACTED] up and guided him to the outer SHU Door where he transferred control to JCO Maxwell.



JCO Ramos grabbed [REDACTED] by the back of his jumpsuit in an attempt to pull away from [REDACTED]. I un-holstered my Oleoresin Capsicum spray and gave a verbal directive from all minors to stop or I would spray. JCO Ramos maintained his grip on the back of [REDACTED] jumpsuit. Both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] continued to exchange blows. As JCO Ramos pulled [REDACTED] back away from [REDACTED], he guided him to the floor. [REDACTED] fell to the floor as well and [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] continued exchanging blows.

I again directed all minors to get down on the floor. I observed [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] remain standing. I sprayed a one second burst of spray hitting [REDACTED] in the center mass of his face. He covered his eyes and dropped to the ground. I sprayed another one second burst of spray hitting [REDACTED] in the center mass of his face. He also covered his eyes and went to the ground. [REDACTED] remained standing and as I attempted to spray him, I realized I had emptied my can. At that moment, JCO Nagra and JCO Wigley arrived and directed the rest of the minors to comply. [REDACTED] backed away taking a seat at one of the tables located in the Central Day Room. The minors were escorted to their rooms without further incident.

After the altercation, [REDACTED] complained of the effects of over spray. When asked if he would like to have a decontamination shower he declined, stating that he did not want one.

Decontamination showers began at 1126 hours and were completed at 1132 hours on [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. At 1134 hours decontamination showers began and were completed at 1156 hours on [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. [REDACTED]'s decontamination shower started at 1138 hours and was completed at 1156 hours. [REDACTED] refused a decontamination shower at 1138 hours.

JCO Ramos spoke with [REDACTED] about the incident and he stated that he does not know why or what happened. He stated he wasn't aware of any problems. [REDACTED] was offered medical treatment which he refused, stating he was okay. JCO Ramos observed a ½ inch scrape above his right eye. [REDACTED] was offered an ice pack, which he accepted.

JCO Ramos spoke with [REDACTED] about the incident and he stated that he was not aware of any problems. He watched his friend, [REDACTED] get hit. Then he got hit and pepper sprayed at approximately the same time. [REDACTED] was offered medical treatment which he refused, stating that he was okay.



As [REDACTED] walked from his room to the Back Day Room, he said something to another youth that appeared to challenge him to a fight. JCO Misulich directed [REDACTED] to have a seat. About five minutes later [REDACTED] was again verbally challenging a different youth to a fight. I verbally directed [REDACTED] to stop as I moved towards him. As I reached his position, I directed him to go to his room for a 15 minute time-out. He refused saying, "I did nothing wrong." I again directed him to go to his room. [REDACTED] stated, "I am not going," as he sat on the bench. I grabbed his left hand. He began to actively resist by pulling away. I pulled [REDACTED] by his left hand and jumpsuit. We both fell on the floor. While on the floor, I was still trying to gain control of his left arm and verbally directing him to stop resisting. He continued to say, "I am not going to my room." JCO Misulich attempted to help gain control of [REDACTED], who was kicking his legs and trying to get away. JCO Misulich gave verbal directives for [REDACTED] to stop. [REDACTED] continued to actively resist both of us. Due to the fact that [REDACTED] was going to continue his struggle against us, JCO Misulich stated, "I am going to spray him." JCO Misulich pulled his oleoresin capsicum spray out and directed [REDACTED] to stop. I stood up. [REDACTED] remained on his back and said, "I'm done." [REDACTED] stood up and walked down B-Unit as I walked behind him. I opened his door and verbally directed him to his room. He stated, "I am not going." I pulled my oleoresin capsicum spray and verbally directed him to go in his room or he would be sprayed. He walked to his room without further incident.

In speaking with [REDACTED] about the incident, I told him he does not have to say anything if he does not want to. He stated he was just stressed out about life and being locked up. He also said he was tired of a certain group of youth talking "shit" to him. [REDACTED] was receptive to counseling and stated he should have just went to his room. [REDACTED] also apologized for his actions.

When asked if he had any injuries [REDACTED] stated his right foot and lower back hurt. He also had a quarter size abrasions on his left elbow, a dime size abrasion on his right

elbow and a dime size abrasion on his right hand. He was given bacitracin for the abrasions. He was also given ibuprofen as it is his regular medication.



[REDACTED] and [REDACTED] began to bear hug each other as [REDACTED] slammed [REDACTED] to the ground. Juvenile Corrections Officer (JCO) Leyva responded from A-Unit, gave verbal directives for the youth to stop fighting, then gave a one second burst of oleoresin capsicum spray towards [REDACTED], hitting him on the forehead. The youth continued to hold each other tightly, so JCO Leyva took control of [REDACTED] while I took control of [REDACTED]. Using my left hand, I placed [REDACTED] left hand in a rear wrist lock. As [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] separated, I continued my control hold and placed [REDACTED] on the ground in a prone control position.

[REDACTED] was escorted to his room by JCO Leyva as I remained in control of [REDACTED] and supervised the remaining youth in the Back Dayroom. JCO Leyva returned, took control of [REDACTED] and escorted him to his room without further incident. Both youth were placed on a standard five minute watch and were offered decontamination showers which both accepted.

ADDENDUM:

On December 25, 2016, at approximately 2020 hours, I was conducting a room check in A-Unit, when I heard JCO Corbin yell for assistance due to an altercation in the Back Dayroom. As I responded, I witnessed [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] in a physical altercation in front of B-Unit. The youth were positioned face-to-face, each engaged in a bear hug of the other youth. [REDACTED]'s arms were wrapped around [REDACTED], under his arms and around his back. [REDACTED]'s arms were wrapped around [REDACTED]'s upper back. [REDACTED] had his head tucked close to [REDACTED]'s left shoulder, in what appeared to be an attempt to avoid further punches.

In a loud and clear voice, I informed the youths to cover or I would spray, but to no avail, [REDACTED] picked [REDACTED] off the ground and slammed him on to the floor, causing [REDACTED] to land on his back with [REDACTED] on top of him. Both youth continued their holds on each other.

As I kept an eye on the other youths in the Back Dayroom, I attempted to gain control of [REDACTED] by grabbing the back of his jumpsuit and pulling him off of [REDACTED], without success. I then asked JCO Corbin to let go of the youth so I could spray. JCO Corbin let go of [REDACTED], backed up, and I sprayed a one second burst of oleoresin capsicum spray to the facial area of [REDACTED]. Another one second burst of oleoresin capsicum spray was directed at [REDACTED] hitting him on the top of his head.

As the one second burst spray did not stop the youths altercation, I went to re-holster my oleoresin capsicum spray missing my holster causing it to hit the ground. I immediately picked up my oleoresin capsicum spray and secured it in my holster. I then took control of [REDACTED]'s left arm, placing my left hand on his left triceps and my right hand on his left wrist. I gained control of [REDACTED] by placing his left arm in a rear wrist lock and was able to then separate [REDACTED] from [REDACTED]. I assisted [REDACTED] to his feet and escorted him to his room.


I then assisted JCO Corbin with [REDACTED] placed my left hand on [REDACTED]'s right triceps and assisted him on to his feet. I escorted him into his assigned room without further issues.

At approximately 2031 hours, I offered [REDACTED] ice, Tylenol, and medical care to which he declined all.







I looked away for a moment, as I looked back I observed a basketball flying through the air at a moderate rate of speed from [REDACTED] position on the basketball court towards [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] was seated on the ground off of the basketball court. The basketball struck [REDACTED] in the face. [REDACTED] responded by rising to her feet and yelling, "I'm going to kill that nigger!"

I began moving towards their location in the recreation yard as I verbally directed [REDACTED] come to me so I could escort him out of the Recreation Yard. [REDACTED] toward me followed closely by [REDACTED], who was running toward him. [REDACTED] ran past me and continued to the other side of the yard. [REDACTED] continued giving chase, yelling, "I'm going to beat your ass!" I continued my verbal

directives for all youth to stop. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] joined in the chase and ran toward [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] grabbed [REDACTED] by his right arm and swung him toward the ground, causing [REDACTED] to fall to the ground. [REDACTED] caught up to [REDACTED] and I observed at least one kick to [REDACTED]'s legs. [REDACTED] regained his footing and began to run again. I directed all youth to stop. Once JCO Origer returned to the Recreation Yard I escorted [REDACTED] into the CDR. Due to being hit in the face with a basketball, I offered [REDACTED] and icepack. Still agitated I let her sit at a table in the CDR and calm down. Once calm she walked to E Unit and with verbal counseling from JCO Origer, Supervising Juvenile Corrections Officer (SJCO) Escherman, and myself, [REDACTED] returned to her room without further incident.

I spoke with [REDACTED] regarding the incident. I advised her of his rights and explained to him he did not have to speak with me if he did not wish to. [REDACTED] asked me, "What did you expect me to do?" I attempted to counsel with her about possible future choices. [REDACTED] stated, "Shut the fuck up, with your white ass." I did not observe any obvious injuries.

I spoke with [REDACTED] regarding the incident. I advised him of his rights and explained to him he did not have to speak with me if he did not wish to. [REDACTED] stated hitting [REDACTED] with the basketball was an accident. I did not observe any visible injuries.






At approximately 1950 hours, I instructed the youth there was ten minutes left in their recreation. [REDACTED] began to make plans for not complying with my directives and encouraged each other to stay up as long as possible.

At approximately 2000 hours, I verbally directed the "C-Status" youth to go to bed. [REDACTED] stood up but refused to go to their rooms. I secured the other "C-Status" youth in their rooms and then addressed the three youth refusing to follow directives. I verbally directed them to their rooms and they ignored my directives, by spreading out around the room. 
At approximately 2004 Hours, JCO Stewart radioed to me for assistance on E-Unit. I responded from my position in the Back Dayroom and as I entered E-Unit, I noticed [REDACTED] standing around in the E-Unit Dayroom. JCO Stewart informed me the youth were refusing to go to their rooms. I verbally directed the youth to line up beside their doors so they could be placed in their rooms. The three youth, began to move around the room, taunting JCO Stewart and myself, stating they were not going to their rooms. The youth verbally encouraged each other to continue in their games of evading staff. I moved toward [REDACTED] and verbally directed him to go to his room. He moved away from me, laughing and stating he was not going to go to his room. As [REDACTED] moved away from me, [REDACTED] moved into the corner near Door 17. I moved closer to him with the intent of containing him in the corner, continuing my verbal directives as I walked toward him. He ignored my directives and pulled the exercise equipment into a position between him and me. He pushed the equipment into my path and quickly moved to a position near the showers. I turned my attention to the shower area as [REDACTED] moved from me. [REDACTED] continued to encourage the others in non-compliance and proceeded to hide in the right hand shower stall behind the curtain. I unholstered my Oleoresin Capsaicin spray and verbally directed the youth to their rooms. All three ignored my directives and continued to move around the room, avoiding being restrained by staff.

At approximately 2007 hours, I re-holstered my Oleoresin Capsaicin spray and radioed for JCO Leyva to place the male youth in the Back Dayroom in their rooms and respond to E-Unit to assist in placing the youth in their rooms. At this point, the youth began making comments such as "Oh shit, Luis is coming over." I continued my verbal directives and attempted to gain control of the youth. [REDACTED] in an attempt to elude my control, climbed up on the picnic table on E-Unit and began to taunt me from his position. [REDACTED] continued to avoid staff by moving to another area of the room any time staff came close to her. As [REDACTED] moved around the room, she began to unstack chairs and place them around the room. She stated, "Let's set up the chairs, so when Luis fucking comes over, it will be harder to get us." [REDACTED] began to help [REDACTED] unstack chairs, but then held a chair up to his chest with the legs pointing out in front of him. I verbally directed him to put the chair down and go to his room. He continued to hold the chair in front of himself. I was able to close the distance between us and I took ahold of the chair by one of the legs. As soon as I took control of the chair, [REDACTED] pushed it away from his chest and moved back into the middle of the room. He picked up another chair and once again held it to his chest in an attempt to keep staff at bay.

At this point, [REDACTED] stated he was done and would go to his room. I moved toward him and verbally directed him to go to his room. He started toward his room, but then stopped stating, "Move back, I don't want you to touch me." I directed him to go to his room, and I verbalized my intent to get him to his room without use of force. He took a few steps toward his door, but then backed away and stated he was not going to his room.

At approximately 2009 hours, JCO Leyva and JCO Brooks arrived to assist. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] moved toward their rooms, stating they were done. I moved toward [REDACTED] room, unlocked it and opened it for her. She complied by going to her room. [REDACTED] was also placed in his room by me. However, [REDACTED] continued to evade staff. JCO Leyva, unholstered his Oleoresin Capsaicin spray and held it down near the outside of his right thigh. He gave [REDACTED] verbal directives to get down on the ground or he would spray [REDACTED] complied by taking a prone position face down on the floor. I assisted [REDACTED] to his feet and escorted him to his room.

At approximately 2025 hours, I opened [REDACTED] door to dispense his medications. He asked if he was receiving a lock up for his behavior. I explained the inappropriateness of his actions, including the possibility of consequences. He stated he did nothing wrong but was just having a little fun. As I explained how his behavior had impacted the routine of the evening, he quickly moved between the doorframe of his room and the medicine cart and re-entered the Dayroom of E-Unit. I locked the medicine cart and engaged [REDACTED] by verbally directing him back to his room. He ignored my directives so, I unholstered my Oleoresin Capsaicin spray and verbally told him to get down on the ground or I would spray him. [REDACTED] complied with my directives and positioned himself on the ground face down. I secured my Oleoresin Capsaicin spray, approached [REDACTED] took control of him by his right shoulder with my right hand, assisted him to his feet and escorted him to his room. Once secured in his room, [REDACTED] requested his medication. I explained I would be back to give him his medications when I was done with passing out the medications in the camp.


ADDENDUM:

At approximately 2007 hours, while supervising the youth in the Back Dayroom, I received a request by radio for assistance from SJCO Hallford. She informed me to secure all minors in the Back Dayroom in their rooms and respond to E-Unit to assist.

After securing all minors in their assigned rooms, I responded to E-Unit and witnessed [REDACTED] holding a plastic chair in his hands as if he was shielding himself with it. It should be noted that at no point during the incident did [REDACTED] threaten to hit anyone with the chair. I attempted to counsel [REDACTED] to put the chair down and go into his

room, but to no avail. I along with JCO Brooks, who had responded from the Camp, managed to corner the youth and informed him that he needed to put the chair down, and go his room. The youth responded with, "Fuck that, I am not going in." I then unholstered my county issued Oleoresin Capsaicin spray and verbally directed [REDACTED] to get down on the ground in the "cover" position or I would spray. I held my canister in my right hand, pointing it to the ground and keeping it close to my right thigh. After giving [REDACTED] one loud and clear cover command, the youth put the chair down and went into the "cover" position.

SJCO Hallford then moved in, placed her open left palm on the minors right triceps and assisted him onto his feet and escorted him into his assigned room where he was placed without any further issues.

On September 24, 2016, at approximately 1556 hours, while supervising youth in the Back Day Room (BDR), several youth, who had previously sat with one group of minors, went over to join another group of youths. This made the first group angry. Both groups of youth began to glare at each other and make inappropriate comments. Juvenile Corrections Officers (JCO) Martinez and I tried to counsel the youth, to no avail.

[REDACTED] began directing racial slurs at the other group. I instructed JCO Stallins to place [REDACTED] in his room. The situation began to escalate, with a number of youth challenging each other. I radioed for backup.

JCO Corbin came through Door 23 and began assisting JCO Stallins with [REDACTED]. I observed [REDACTED] jump up and start to run in the direction of the other group.

I deployed a one second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum, making contact with the center mass of [REDACTED] face. He immediately dropped to the ground. In my spraying of [REDACTED] there was overspray that made contact with the center of JCO Corbin's face. I radioed additional backup.

[REDACTED] began to verbally threaten "to beat the asses" of some other youth. I instructed her to stand up and go to her room on A-Unit. JCO Martinez escorted her to A-Unit,

without further incident. Interim Supervising Juvenile Corrections Officer (ISJCO) Castillo and JCO Perez arrived in the Back Day Room to assist.

I observed [REDACTED] stand up behind the table he was seated at. I verbally directed him to sit back down. He immediately complied. JCO Martinez took [REDACTED] into room eight to rinse off the Oleoresin Capsicum spray. I directed staff to start putting minors in their rooms.

[REDACTED] and [REDACTED] stated they were not going down. [REDACTED] began to assume an aggressive posture, indicating he wanted to fight. I directed staff to place him in his room. JCO Martinez placed [REDACTED] in his room without further incident. I repeated my directive for [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] to go to their rooms. They slowly got up and moved toward their rooms. [REDACTED] began directing several inappropriate comments at me.

At this time, I moved the girls off A-Unit to E-Unit allowing the decontamination process to begin. I was informed [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] received some overspray so they went through the decontamination process.

On September 24, 2016, at approximately 1556 hours, while supervising open recreation in the Back Day Room, [REDACTED] began to argue with other youths. I verbally instructed everyone to stop arguing. [REDACTED] ignored my directive. I directed him to go to his room.

As I entered the Back Day Room, [REDACTED] was being escorted to his room by Juvenile Corrections Officer (JCO) Stallins and was resisting. I assisted JCO Stallins in controlling [REDACTED] by placing my left hand on his left arm and placing my right knee on his left leg.

At approximately 1556 hours, I observed [REDACTED] quickly stand up. JCO Stallins had [REDACTED] under control, so I positioned myself behind [REDACTED] and placed my right hand on the collar of his jumpsuit. JCO Maxwell gave him verbal directives to sit down, he did not respond.

JCO Maxwell sprayed [REDACTED] using a short burst of Oleoresin Capsicum spray. [REDACTED] laid down on the floor, face down, and began to yell, "ow, ow" repeatedly. [REDACTED] attempted to get up by pushing himself back up. I placed my right hand in between his shoulder blades to keep him from getting up.

At approximately 1559 hours, as the Back Day Room was being cleared of other minors, I escorted [REDACTED] with JCO Stallins to Room 17 to begin a decontamination eye rinse. As [REDACTED] got up, he punched the open door to Room 17.

At 1600 hours, I began to give [REDACTED] a decontamination eye wash. During the eye wash, [REDACTED] stated, "I need to go to the nurse right now." I told [REDACTED] to continue flushing his eye. He stated, "No, not my eyes, my hand. I think it's broken. I can't move it." I observed that [REDACTED] hand was red and swollen.

ADDENDUM:


On September 24, 2016, at approximately 1550 hours, my staff and I received a radio transmission from Juvenile Corrections Officer (JCO) Martinez requesting a Camp staff to help with dinner for the Juvenile Hall. I directed JCO Corbin to go assist.


Immediately after JCO Corbin left, JCO Maxwell radioed for back up in the Back Day Room of the Juvenile Hall. I directed JCO Perez to go assist. JCO Maxwell continued to call for back up.

I radioed JCO Montez to come watch over the West Day Room where all the Camp youth were. As soon as JCO Montez arrived I ran through the Dining Hall to assist hall staff. As I arrived, I observed [REDACTED] on the ground shouting out in pain, covering his face with his hands. One of the staff opened room 17 in order for [REDACTED] to begin to wash Oleoresin Capsicum spray out of his eyes. As staff assisted [REDACTED] to his feet he struck door 17 with a closed hand.

JCO Maxwell gave the directive to begin putting all the youth back into their cells. [REDACTED] was one of the first to be put down. While JCO Martinez was escorting [REDACTED] was shouting derogatory remarks towards all of the African-American youth who were all bunched up together. Once [REDACTED] was down, a majority of the Hispanic youth began shouting out derogatory remarks to both staff and the African-American group. One by one each youth began to comply with staff directives to go down. Only three youth refused to go down, ZAYARA DAUNIVIERA ALVARADO.


Staff counseled with the three youth. Through their counseling efforts, they were able to get the three youth in their cells without further incident. Once all youth were down decontamination showers began.



[REDACTED] abruptly stood up and moved in front of [REDACTED] then he reached down and grabbed something from [REDACTED]. I moved from my position at the top of B-Unit to a position near the youth. As I moved, I verbally directed the two youth to sit down. [REDACTED] complied, however [REDACTED] refused to sit down. I again gave him the directive to sit down. He replied, "I'll sit down when I am ready to sit down." I gave him the verbal directive again and he complied. At this time, the three youth turned their focus to the television and I returned to my position near the top of B-Unit.


At approximately 1850 hours, the three youth engaged in horseplay, which resulted in [REDACTED] standing up without permission and grabbing something from [REDACTED]. I verbally directed them to stop horseplaying and to sit down. [REDACTED] complied, but [REDACTED] stated, "Miss Pam, don't you know? No one cares. We are going to do what we want." I moved to a position near [REDACTED] and began to explain the expectations. [REDACTED] interrupted me and asked, "Where does it say that we can't play around? Get off our case. We are just having some fun." I explained the rules and expectations were displayed on the wall near the grade sheets. He responded by stating again that he did not care about the rules and he was going to do as he wanted and nothing staff could do would change his thinking.

At approximately 2025, the youth were directed to turn their jumpsuits in for laundry. [REDACTED] began to take his jumpsuit off, which included removing his shoes. [REDACTED] exchanged his shoes for the ones [REDACTED] had removed. He then stood in the middle of the Back Dayroom and asked to be placed in his room. I verbally directed him to give [REDACTED] back his shoes. [REDACTED] refused and began to move around the room so staff could not restrain him. I again verbally directed him to give [REDACTED]

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back his shoes. [REDACTED] refused to comply and continued to request to go to his room. On the third verbal directive, [REDACTED] approached [REDACTED] and gave him back his shoes. My attempt to counsel with [REDACTED] about his behavior met with resistance as he stated, he did not care.

This pattern of willful defiant behavior of horseplay and not following staff directions followed by periods of compliant behavior continued until approximately 2035 hours. At this time, [REDACTED] stood up and began to perform "cart-wheels" across the Back Dayroom. He performed three "cart-wheels" in one direction then turned around and performed four more going the opposite direction. I verbally directed him to go to his room. He refused by stating he was staying up until he got his full time. I verbally directed him to his room a second time. He again refused and began to move away from me into the center of the Back Dayroom. I told him to go to his room or I would make him go to his room. He turned and ran passed the showers and down A-Unit toward Door 24. I followed him and as I entered A-Unit, I verbally directed him to get down on the ground. He refused and remained standing at the end of A-Unit. I unholstered my Oleoresin-Capsicum spray and again verbally directed [REDACTED] to get down on the ground. He pulled his shirt up over his face and turned to face the corner. I closed the distance between us and continued my verbal directives for him to get down on the ground. He remained where he was facing away from me. I continued to repeat my directives several times and he continued to refuse by remaining in the corner between Room 4 and Door 24. Since [REDACTED] was avoiding being sprayed by not offering a clear target, I secured my Oleoresin-Capsicum spray and attempted a Bar-Arm to a circle take down. I grasped [REDACTED] right wrist with my right hand and began to swing his arm up and over to secure the Bar-Arm. As I began the maneuver, [REDACTED] pulled his arm free from my control and ran to the Back Dayroom. Juvenile Corrections Officer Leyva and I were able to maneuver [REDACTED] in the corner near Door 21. I took control of [REDACTED] left wrist with my right hand as JCO Leyva took control of [REDACTED] right side. At this time, [REDACTED] pulled his wrist away from mine and grasped my right wrist with his left hand and my left wrist with his right hand. I performed a "Shin-Scrape/Heel Strike" to his left shin by scrapping downward from his knee to his ankle with the exterior portion of my right foot. He continued to control my wrists, so I moved into a position and prepared to knee him in the stomach area. At this point, JCO Leyva stated he had control of [REDACTED] and directed me to disengage. So, I pulled away from [REDACTED] and allowed JCO Leyva to take control.

ADDENDUM:


I was collecting jumpsuits from C-Unit when I heard Supervising Juvenile Corrections Officer Hallford verbally direct [REDACTED] to stop horse playing and have a seat. I then heard [REDACTED] reply with, "Fuck you bitch, I do what I want when I want," I immediately secured room 22's door and responded to the Back Dayroom to assist SJCO Hallford with the issue at hand. As I approached the Back Dayroom, [REDACTED] ran away from SJCO Hallford and into the direction of A-Unit. SJCO Hallford proceeded to follow the youth into A-Unit and was constantly giving him loud and clear verbal commands to stop and go to his room but to no avail. As SJCO Hallford and youth [REDACTED] reached the end of A-Unit and out of my sight, I kept the other nine youths in the Back Dayroom seated and quiet. It should be noted the nine youth followed my directives to keep calm while we dealt with the issue at hand. As I continued to supervise the nine youth, I heard SJCO Hallford verbally demand youth [REDACTED] to get down numerous times. SJCO Hallford was then heard saying, "Get down or I'm going to spray you," [REDACTED] replied with, "If you spray me I'll fuck you up bitch," It should be noted during this incident I was standing to the right side of the Personal Items Closet with my back to the wall supervising the youths that were currently in the Back Dayroom.

[REDACTED] then came running from A-Unit into the Back Dayroom where I trailed him and cornered him in front of Door 21. SJCO Hallford approached the youth and verbally directed him to get on the ground and into the cover position but to no avail. SJCO Hallford continued to counsel the youth as I maintained a clear visual of the other youths in the Back Dayroom. SJCO Hallford then attempted to grab the youth wrist but was unsuccessful due to the youth continuing to resist and pull away. I then asked SJCO Hallford to just let the youth go and I'll take him to his room. Right when SJCO Hallford was about to let go, the youth was able to pull away from SJCO Hallford hold, stand up straight and run to A-Unit once again. I then proceeded to trail him while SJCO Hallford supervised the other minors in the Back Dayroom.

When I came face to face with [REDACTED] I began counseling him. [REDACTED] appeared to calm down and informed me he would go into his room because I had asked him to, not SJCO Hallford. I then escorted the youth from A-Unit into D-Unit and into his assigned room without any further issues.


At approximately 2117 hours, I went to [REDACTED] room and began to counsel him on his behavior. When I asked him why was he acting in this manner, he replied, "Because I'm just tired, I'm tired of all this shit." I then asked him why today and why on this shift? He said, "Because I know it's only you and two other females. I know nobody will responded." He went on to say, "I like you Leyva, I'm sorry for doing it on your shift, but it's just that Pam irritated the shit out of me and that's why I did it." I continued to counsel the minor and asked him if he would apologize to SJCO Hallford for what he put her through and all the names he called her. He replied with, "Fuck no, but I'll apologize to you, sorry Mr. Leyva, I won't do that again."


I then informed him of the potential consequences, and he nodded his head as if he understood. I accepted his apology and closed the door without any further issues.







[REDACTED] began to struggle in an attempt to escape my hold. JCO Wigley directed her spray towards him and gave a verbal warning that any further resistance will result in him being sprayed. [REDACTED] became compliant. I was able to assist him to his feet and escort him to his room without further incident.

[REDACTED] was informed he did not have to speak to me regarding the incident. He did state he did not know why the incident occurred. I observed redness to the left side of his cheek area. I did not observe any other injuries or swelling. When asked if he required any first aid, he stated, "No, I'm fine."





I deployed a one second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum spray at ██████████ hitting him in the face. I attempted to spray ██████████, but he ducked and ran around the other side of the table towards ██████████. ██████████ attempted to throw a right closed fist punch at ██████████. ██████████ kicked ██████████, pushing him away. I radioed for assistance, and then deployed a one second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum spray missing ██████████ for the second time. ██████████ immediately ran to the southwest side of the Dining Hall.

At this time, Supervising Juvenile Corrections Officers (SJCO) Romero, Deputy Superintendent Hungrige, JCO Fui, Therapist Tony Kildare, JCO II Nagra all responded to the Dining Hall. I continued to scan the room keeping ██████████ beside me while

DETAILS OF INCIDENT:

On November 30, 2017, Supervising Juvenile Corrections Officer (SJCO) Escheman, Juvenile Corrections Officer (JCO) Aleman, and I were supervising youth in the Back Day Room (BDR) for open recreation. I was positioned in front of the C-unit hallway when I observed [REDACTED] ask permission to throw away trash and use the phone. At 1946 hours, [REDACTED] was given permission by me to get up. He walked to the trashcan, threw away his trash, and walked around the corner and picked up the phone.

At 1947 hours, [REDACTED] asked SJCO Escheman if he could pick out a movie. SJCO Escheman gave [REDACTED] permission to get up. As [REDACTED] walked to the entrance of storage closet 33, [REDACTED] asked me if he could move closer to the television. I gave him permission and he moved and sat down to the right of [REDACTED]. As [REDACTED] was sitting down, SJCO Escheman stepped inside storage closet 33. Approximately 30 seconds later, I observed [REDACTED] stand up and without provocation, begin throwing closed fist punches toward the head area of [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] did not engage [REDACTED]. I

immediately moved from my position toward the youth, while giving verbal directives to stop fighting. [REDACTED] ignored my directives and continued throwing closed fist punches. JCO Aleman and I took control of [REDACTED] placing him in a bear hug and assisting him and [REDACTED] to the floor. While on the floor, [REDACTED] continued to resist and tried to re-engage [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] took control of [REDACTED] jumpsuit with both of my hands to hold him in a prone position. [REDACTED] continued to try and kick [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] remained in the prone position, using his hands to cover his head in an attempt to block the kicks. When JCO Aleman and I were able to move [REDACTED] away from [REDACTED], [REDACTED] was still face down in the prone position. I took control of [REDACTED]'s right arm with both of my hands and I attempted to put him in a rear wrist lock. [REDACTED] continued to resist my efforts to control him. I looked up and observed a large group of youth stand up and begin running towards the other side of the Back Day Room.


I proceeded to release my hold of [REDACTED] while JCO Aleman continued to hold [REDACTED] in a bear hug on the floor. I stood up and un-holstered my Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) spray. I observed [REDACTED] kicking a youth who was on the floor, so I sprayed a one second burst of OC spray, making contact with the right side of his face. [REDACTED] regained his footing and struggled free from JCO Aleman's hold. I turned and observed [REDACTED] throwing closed fist punches connecting with the head area of [REDACTED] who was still seated in his chair. I deployed a one second burst of OC spray making contact with the left side of [REDACTED] face.

[REDACTED] proceeded to grab [REDACTED] and both youth fell to the floor. I attempted to separate the two youth, as both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were on the ground throwing punches at each other. I deployed a one second burst of OC spray making contact with the center mass of [REDACTED] face. I used my left hand to take hold of [REDACTED] jumpsuit and pull the two youth apart. I then gave verbal directives for [REDACTED] to stop or I would spray him. [REDACTED] complied with my directive. [REDACTED] affected by the OC spray, remained on the floor in the prone position covering his face. While standing over the top of [REDACTED] I gave verbal directives for all the youth to get down.

I observed [REDACTED] move from the phone area and begin throwing closed fist punches towards [REDACTED] who was laying on the ground. [REDACTED] did not engage [REDACTED] and remained in prone position, while covering his head with his hands. SJCO Escherman moved towards the two youth and attempted to take control of [REDACTED]. I assisted by placing my left hand on the back of [REDACTED] jumpsuit and with my right hand deployed a burst of OC spray which missed his face area. [REDACTED] continued to struggle with me and began to re-engage [REDACTED]. I was able to assist [REDACTED] to the floor. He landed on his hands and knees, and attempted to get back up to his feet. I reached around [REDACTED] and sprayed a one second burst of OC spray, which made contact with the center mass of his face. [REDACTED] stopped resisting and laid on the floor next to the drinking fountain.

I observed [REDACTED] move from the shower area into the BDR. I verbally directed him to lay on the floor or I would spray him. [REDACTED] failed to follow my directive and proceeded to move over to where [REDACTED] was laying prone. [REDACTED] began throwing closed fist punches at [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] did not engage [REDACTED]. I moved towards [REDACTED] and took control of the back of his jumpsuit with my left hand and assisted him to the floor. [REDACTED] was lying face down and trying to get up, so I placed my left knee on his right shoulder blade. I re-holstered my OC spray as [REDACTED] continued to resist my control by trying to get up. I pushed him back down to the floor with both hands and used my right hand to place his right arm in a rear wrist lock. I assisted him to his feet and escorted him to his room.

At 1956 hours, decontamination showers began for [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. The decontamination showers were completed at 2013 hours. The youth declined the remainder of their shower time and opted to end their showers after 17 minutes. At 2015 hours, decontamination showers began for [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. The decontamination showers were completed at 2021 hours. The youth declined the remainder of their shower time and opted to end their showers after 6 minutes. At 2024 hours, decontamination showers began for [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. The decontamination showers were completed for [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] at 2037 hours. The youth declined the remainder of their shower time and opted to end their showers after 13 minutes. [REDACTED] completed his decontamination shower at 2039 hours. ADDENDUM

At 1947 hours, [REDACTED] requested to move from his position at the north end of the BDR closer to the television. JCO Phillips allowed [REDACTED] to move. [REDACTED] placed his chair approximately five feet to the right of [REDACTED]. Unprovoked, [REDACTED] stood up and began to strike [REDACTED] multiple times in the head with closed fists. JCO Phillips and I gave verbal directives for [REDACTED] to stop as I moved towards him. I attempted to gain control of [REDACTED] by placing him in a bear hug and directing him to

the floor. This caused both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] to fall to the floor in a seated position. With my right arm, I used an upward motion to hook [REDACTED]'s right underarm. I then moved him to a prone position on the floor. JCO Phillips took hold of [REDACTED]'s jumpsuit to hold him in the prone position.

I heard [REDACTED] yell, "Let's crack it off!" At this time, a group of youth on the north side of the BDR ran over and began attacking youth on the south end of the BDR. [REDACTED] began to get up and I gave him a verbal directive to stay down or I would spray him. [REDACTED] ignored my directive and continued to struggle in an attempt to regain his footing. I deployed a one second burst of OC spray making contact to [REDACTED]'s eye area. I stood up and observed [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] facing each other in an aggressive stance. I verbally directed both youth to get on the floor or I would spray them, and both youth ignored my directives. I deployed a one second burst of OC spray, making contact to the head and face area of [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] ran down the hallway towards A-unit. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] pursued him. [REDACTED] was already on A-unit, in an attempt to avoid the conflict.

I pursued [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] towards A-unit. When I arrived on A-unit, both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] had [REDACTED] trapped in the corner next to Door 6. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were striking [REDACTED] with closed fists about the head area and kneeling him repeatedly in the abdomen area. I directed [REDACTED] to stop and get on the floor or they would be sprayed. All three youth did not comply. I deployed one second bursts of OC spray making contact in their face areas. They continued to throw closed fist punches. I again directed [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] to stop fighting or they would be sprayed again. They did not comply, so I sprayed them again with a one second burst of OC spray. At this point, my OC canister was depleted. I used my left hand to take hold of [REDACTED]'s jumpsuit and pull him away from [REDACTED]. I used my right hand to take control of the back collar of [REDACTED]'s jumpsuit and pulled him away from [REDACTED]. As a result, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] fell to the floor. I placed my right knee on [REDACTED]'s lower thigh area and used my right arm to hold [REDACTED] on the floor. [REDACTED] continued to struggle and was able to get out of my control. He stood up and attempted to re-engage [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] stood between [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. I attempted to verbally de-escalate [REDACTED] stating, "Stop. That's enough." [REDACTED] ran back down the hallway toward the BDR. [REDACTED] remained in the corner, while [REDACTED] remained on the floor. [REDACTED] remained at the far end of A-Unit.

SJCO Wigley and JCO Montez entered Door 6 to assist JCO Phillips and SJCO Eschelman in the BDR. I permitted [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] remain where they were as I assisted [REDACTED] to his feet. [REDACTED] was affected by the OC spray, requiring me to physically direct him to his room. As I was escorting him, he was yelling but I was unable to hear his words due to the noise level in the BDR.

After placing [REDACTED] in his room, I observed [REDACTED] standing in the BDR. I took control of [REDACTED]'s right arm and escorted him to his room without further incident. While getting youth up for decontamination showers, [REDACTED] yelled, "Congratulations, you are all now my co-defendants!"

I observed [REDACTED] on the floor by the water fountain. He was on his knees with his head down, and it appeared he had been affected by overspray from the OC spray. I secured [REDACTED]'s jumpsuit, and verbally directed the rest of the youth to get down on the floor, which several youth ignored. As I did so, [REDACTED] ran from behind me and began striking [REDACTED] with closed fist punches. JCO Phillips and I responded and attempted to gain control of [REDACTED]. I disengaged to maintain supervision and crowd control of the rest of the group.

I again verbally directed the entire group of youth to get down on the floor, when I observed [REDACTED] crawl over to [REDACTED] and begin hitting him in the head with closed fist punches. I responded and attempted to pull [REDACTED] away from [REDACTED]. Unable to secure his hand, I grasped [REDACTED]'s jumpsuit with my right hand and his ponytail in my left hand and pulled him away from [REDACTED]. Maintaining my hold, I knelt next to [REDACTED], placing my right knee on his left side. [REDACTED] continued to resist, but I maintained control of him.

Supervising Juvenile Corrections Officer (SJCO) Wigley responded from Camp Singer, secured my OC spray and assisted [REDACTED] to his feet. SJCO Wigley was able to escort [REDACTED] to his room without further incident. JCO Montez also responded from the Camp Singer, secured my keys and began placing youth in their rooms. SJCO Wigley assisted with crowd control, when she observed [REDACTED] standing and verbally directed [REDACTED] to get on the floor. [REDACTED] failed to comply and SJCO Wigley repeated her directive. [REDACTED] failed to follow her directive and instead sat in a chair. SJCO Wigley again directed [REDACTED] to get on the floor or she would spray him and [REDACTED] slowly complied. I assisted [REDACTED] to his feet and escorted him in his room without further incident. I returned to the BDR, assisted [REDACTED] to his feet and placed him in his room without further incident.

Once all the youth were placed in their rooms, I reviewed the video footage of the altercation. At 19:46:34 hours, I observed [REDACTED] walk towards the trash can, and throw trash away. [REDACTED] appeared to use the phone after throwing away the trash. At 19:47:05 hours, I was able to observe [REDACTED] walk towards my location at Room 33. At 19:47:11 hours, [REDACTED] walked to the camera in the southeast corner of the BDR, and [REDACTED] moved his chair and sat closer to [REDACTED]. At 19:47:15 hours, I entered Room 33. At 19:47:20 hours, [REDACTED] stood up and began striking [REDACTED] with closed fist punches without provocation. At 19:47:21 hours, [REDACTED] stood on a chair and covered the northeast camera with his sweatshirt, as [REDACTED] covered the southeast camera with his sweatshirt. At 19:47:41 hours, the northeast camera became unblocked and I was able to observe [REDACTED] grabbing my shoulders in an attempt to pull me off of [REDACTED] while he was kicking [REDACTED]. At 19:47:46 hours, I observed [REDACTED] run across the BDR, jump in the air, and with both feet kick [REDACTED] in the chest and stomach. At 19:48:00 hours, I observed [REDACTED] throwing a chair in the direction of the altercation, attempting to hit [REDACTED]. At 19:48:06 hours, I observed [REDACTED] displaying what appears to be gang hand

signs. At 19:48:40 and 19:50:35 hours, I observed [REDACTED] displaying what appears to be gang hand signs.

At 2031 hours, while distributing evening medications, I spoke with [REDACTED] and asked if he had any injuries. He stated he had some OC spray in his hair, but he was "good." I did not observe any obvious injuries.

At 2032 hours, while distributing evening medications, I spoke with [REDACTED] and asked if he had any injuries. [REDACTED] stated, "No." I did not observe any obvious injuries.

At 2039 hours, while distributing evening medications, I spoke with [REDACTED] and asked if he had any injuries. [REDACTED] stated, "I'm fine." I did not observe any obvious injuries.





On April 8, 2017, at approximately 0722 hours, I was supervising the youth in the Dining Hall for breakfast. [REDACTED], began to pass out the napkins. As he neared the table where [REDACTED] was seated, [REDACTED] struck [REDACTED] in the body with the closed fist of his left hand. [REDACTED] stood up and began exchanging closed fist punches with [REDACTED]. I responded from my position at the south end of the Dining Hall. As I approached, I unholstered my Oleoresin Capsicum spray. I deployed a one second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum spray, which missed both youth and struck the wall at the north end of the Dining Hall. The youth continued to exchange closed fist punches, as well as attempt to knee each other in the lower body. I deployed a second burst of Oleoresin Capsicum spray striking [REDACTED] on the left side of his face. [REDACTED] then pulled [REDACTED] to the ground. [REDACTED] ended up on his back face up, with [REDACTED] on top of him. [REDACTED] pushed [REDACTED] toward the wall, gaining a position of advantage. At this time, Juvenile Corrections Officer (JCO) Misulich took control of [REDACTED]. Once [REDACTED] was clear of [REDACTED], I assisted [REDACTED] to his feet and restrained him against the north wall of the Dining Hall using my right hand on the back of his jumpsuit collar and my left hand to control his left wrist. [REDACTED] was compliant so, it was not necessary to place him in a rear wrist lock. I radioed to JCO Phillips, informing him of the altercation and requesting his assistance in the Dining Hall. Then, I began to give verbal directives to "sit down on the ground" to the other youth in the Dining Hall. Once JCO Phillips arrived, JCO Misulich assisted [REDACTED] his feet and escorted him from the Dining Hall. Supervising Juvenile Corrections Officer Wigley responded from Camp Singer and assisted with crowd control. So, I began to escort [REDACTED] from the Dining Hall. I neared Door 101-B, when JCO Misulich returned to the Dining Hall. As I began to pass control of [REDACTED] to JCO Misulich, [REDACTED] stood up from his position on the floor beside the table next to Door 101-B and struck [REDACTED] in the head with the closed fist of his right hand. [REDACTED] struck [REDACTED] once then jumped back toward his seat. [REDACTED] attempted to re-engage with [REDACTED]. I stepped between [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], facing my left arm across [REDACTED] chest halting his forward progress. I used my right hand on the back of his right shoulder to turn him away from [REDACTED]. As I bent [REDACTED] over the table near Door 101-B, my left arm slipped from his chest area to

his neckline. I relaxed my left arm and used my right hand to gain control of his right wrist. As I maneuvered his right hand behind his back, [REDACTED] attempted to push up and off the table. At this time, [REDACTED] became compliant, so I relaxed my holds and waited for JCO Misulich to return to the Dining Hall. When JCO Misulich returned, I verbally directed [REDACTED] to stand up. I guided him out of the Dining Hall through Door-101B, where I released my hold of his right hand. I maintained control of his jumpsuit collar as I escorted him to Room 27 without further incident.



I heard a scuffled and saw SJCO Hallford quickly moving towards the north end of the Dining Hall, where [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were engaged in a fight. I immediately moved in to assist. I took ahold of [REDACTED]'s right arm with my left hand and pulled it across his chest. I then placed my right hand on his right shoulder and pulled him away from [REDACTED]. As I was pulling [REDACTED] away from [REDACTED], [REDACTED] tried to pull away from me to reengage in the fight. I continued my hold and twisted my hips while pulling [REDACTED] away causing him to fall to the ground on his right

side. [REDACTED] attempted to get up, so I wrapped my left arm across the back of his shoulders at the neck line and rolled him over to his back, face up. I verbally directed [REDACTED] to stop resisting as I took control of his left wrist. While supervising youth in the Dining Hall for breakfast, I observed [REDACTED] dump his tray. As he returned to his seat, he struck [REDACTED] in the face with a closed fist punch. He continued to strike [REDACTED] with both hands, using closed fist punches. I responded from my position, giving verbal directives for him to stop. JCO Corbin arrived before I could and took control of [REDACTED]. I heard quick steps behind me. When I turned around, I observed [REDACTED] engaged in a physical altercation with [REDACTED] MARKHAM LOVE in the center of the Dining Hall. Both youth were throwing and connecting with closed fist punches.

As I responded from my position, I observed [REDACTED] MARKHAM LOVE break away from [REDACTED] and begin throwing closed fist punches at [REDACTED] who was seated at a nearby table. [REDACTED] fell to the floor as [REDACTED] re-engaged [REDACTED] MARKHAM LOVE. [REDACTED] stood up and sat back at the table as [REDACTED] MARKHAM LOVE and [REDACTED] MARTINEZ continued to exchange closed fist punches. I deployed a one second burst of pepper spray in the direction of the [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] MARKHAM LOVE. I missed both youth,

hitting the wall between the service window and the door. EHJCO Crittendon took control of the back of [REDACTED] jumpsuit, but [REDACTED] continued to throw punches at [REDACTED]. I deployed another one second burst of pepper spray, hitting [REDACTED] in the face and hitting [REDACTED] in the right side of the face. Both youth stopped fighting and EHJCO Crittendon was able to gain control of them.

As I turned to scan the room, I observed [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] engaged in a physical altercation. Both youth were throwing and landing closed fist punches. I deployed a one second burst of pepper spray, which hit [REDACTED] in the face. Both youth continued to engage in the altercation, so I attempted to separate them. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] embraced each other as they continued to fight. They stumbled and fell to the ground, with me on top of [REDACTED] who was on top of [REDACTED]. I was able to deploy a one second burst of pepper spray, hitting [REDACTED] in the face and causing [REDACTED] to receive overspray.

I re-holstered my pepper spray as both youth struggled to get out from underneath me. I was able to secure my hold of [REDACTED] by placing my right arm across his shoulders and applying downward pressure. I secured [REDACTED] by placing my left hand across his shoulders and applying downward pressure. [REDACTED] attempted to break away from my hold and was able to get his feet under him. He stood up and I released my control of [REDACTED] in order to gain full control of [REDACTED]. I placed my left arm over his right shoulder and grabbed the back of his jumpsuit. I placed my right hand on his left arm and guided him away from [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] and I fell to the floor where I was able to gain control of him using my upper body to secure his upper body and my legs to secure his lower body. Once I had a secure hold on [REDACTED] I verbally directed [REDACTED] to get down on the ground and he complied. JCO Stegall arrived from the camp and assisted in the escorting of the youth from the Dining Hall. When it was time for [REDACTED] to exit the Dining Hall, I verbally directed him to roll over on to his stomach and he complied. I then verbally directed him to place his right hand behind his back and he complied. I assisted him to a standing position and escorted him to Door 101-B, where I turned control of him over to JCO Pfeffer. Once all of the youth had been escorted from the Dining Hall, I confirmed the count of forks, cups, and trays.

At approximately 0710 hours, as I escorted the female youth through Door 6 to line up for breakfast, I heard a youth on B-unit yelling the word, "nigger." He was yelling it in a mocking manner. I heard another youth yell, "Do it again Walker. Do it again." I responded to B-unit and verbally directed the youth to show pride and be quiet in their rooms. They complied. It is my belief, this mocking derogatory behavior, was the catalyst to the incident in the Dining Hall.

This annual security review is submitted in compliance with the provisions of California Code of Regulations, Title 15; Section 1326.

On November 10, 2015, a review of the safety and security issues related to Juvenile Hall was conducted. The following areas were reviewed;

Assaults on Staff – During fiscal year 2014 - 2015, our records indicate there were two reported incidents of staff being assaulted by minors housed in Juvenile Hall. In the first case, a female youth was being escorted to her room by staff after she began behaving aggressively and refused to return to her room. During the escort, the youth dropped to the floor and started to kick at staff, striking the staff member in the knee. The staff did not require follow up medical attention.

The second incident involved a youth with serious mental health issues. During mealtime this youth stood up and struck a staff member in the face. The youth then placed the staff member in a head lock and began choking the staff member before other staff was able to control the youth. As a result, the staff member had swelling to the face from being struck. His injuries were determined not serious and he did not seek further medical treatment.

Oleoresin Capsicum Pepper Spray – There were eighteen incidents over the last year in which staff deployed O.C. spray on detained youth. This was an increase of two deployments from the previous year's security review. All of the incidents occurred during physical altercations between youths; with O.C. spray being used to stop their physical assaults. In all of the incidents where O.C. spray was deployed the youth were quickly controlled, minimizing the occurrence of injury to youth and staff. A review of each incident involving the application of O.C. spray confirmed the decontamination process was followed correctly and the youth were placed in their rooms without further incident. 11 incidents involved four or more youths fighting simultaneously. Without the use of O.C. spray, these situations would not have been resolved as quick and safely as they were.

Escapes – During fiscal year 2014 – 15, there were two escapes from the juvenile hall. Both escapes occurred during outside recreation. The youth who escaped were able to climb over the security fencing in the main recreation yard. One youth was quickly apprehended minutes after he escaped and the other youth was returned to the facility six hours after his departure. Repairs were made to the fence area where both youth climbed out and there have been no further attempts of escape to date.

This annual security review is submitted in compliance with the provisions of California Code of Regulations, Title 15; Section 1326.

On July 12, 2017, a review of the safety and security issues related to Juvenile Hall was conducted. The following areas were reviewed;

Assaults on Staff – During fiscal year 2016 - 2017, our records indicate there were three reported incidents of staff being assaulted by youth housed in Juvenile Hall. In the first case, a male youth was asked to leave the classroom. The youth became angry, picked up a pencil, and threw it at teaching staff. The pencil hit the teacher in the back. There were no injuries as a result.

The second incident involved a male youth who was directed to leave the classroom due to being disruptive to the learning environment. As the youth left the classroom, he picked up a pencil, and threw it at teaching staff. The pencil hit the teacher in the head. There were no injuries to the teacher as a result of the pencil hitting her in the head.

The final incident of staff being assaulted occurred when a male youth was stopped by staff from moving out of line, during population movement. The staff extended their arm out to stop the youth and the youth struck the staff's arm with a closed fist. There were no injuries to the staff, as a result of being struck in the arm.

Oleoresin Capsicum Pepper Spray – There were 7 incidents over the last fiscal year in which staff deployed O.C. spray on detained youth. This was 56.25% decrease from the previous year's security review. All of the incidents occurred during physical altercations between youth; with O.C. spray being used to stop their physical assaults. In all of the incidents where O.C. spray was deployed, the youth were quickly controlled, minimizing the occurrence of injury to youth and staff. A review of each incident involving the application of O.C. spray confirmed the decontamination process was followed correctly and the youth were placed in their rooms without further incident. Four incidents involved four or more youth fighting simultaneously, which was a slight increase from the previous year of three incidents. Without the use of O.C. spray, these situations would not have been resolved as quick and safely as they were.

The report is reviewed by the shift Supervisor, Deputy Superintendent of the specific facility (camp or hall) and then the Superintendent. The department's Use of Force Instructors review the incident and report back their findings.
3. What methods does staff utilize with regards to use of force? Establish a relationship; physical (command) presence; verbal commands, physical control (escort); compliance holds; pepper spray; soft restraints (used as a last resort). Weaponless defense training is provided twice/year.







ARTICLE 5 – Classification and Separation

SECTION 1357: Use of Force

Source: Title 15, Section 1357

PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides guidelines on the reasonable use of force. While there is no way to specify the exact amount or type of reasonable force to be applied in any situation, every member of this department is expected to use these guidelines to make such decisions in a professional, impartial and reasonable manner.

1357.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include:

Force - The application of physical techniques or tactics, chemical agents or weapons to another person. It is not a use of force when a person allows him/herself to be searched, escorted, or handcuffed.

1357.2 POLICY

The use of force by law enforcement personnel is a matter of critical concern, both to the public and to the law enforcement community. Officers are involved on a daily basis in numerous and varied interactions and, when warranted, may use reasonable force in carrying out their duties. Officers must have an understanding of, and true appreciation for, their authority and limitations. This is especially true with respect to overcoming resistance while engaged in the performance of law enforcement duties. The Department recognizes and respects the value of all human life and dignity without prejudice to anyone. Vesting officers with the authority to use reasonable force and to protect the public welfare requires monitoring, evaluation and a careful balancing of all interests. The use of physical force by staff must be avoided whenever reasonably possible and is only authorized to maintain the safety and security of youth, staff and visitors within the Institution. Physical force shall never be used for the purposes of punishment, discipline, or treatment. The use of chemical agents shall be in accordance with standards set forth in sections 12403.7 through 12460 of the California Penal Code and California Code of Regulations Title 15, Article 5, Section 1358. Any employee who fails to comply with these regulations shall be subject to disciplinary action, unless the employee can adequately justify the action taken was legal, safe, and necessary. The burden of such justification is on the employee.

Best practice: In situations where the use of physical force is utilized, staff will make attempts to re-establish a relationship with the youth through counselling methods. The intent is to help the youth identify the behavior which resulted in staff's use of force and assist the youth in behavior modification.

1357.2.1 DUTY TO INTERCEDE

Any officer present and observing another officer using force which is clearly beyond what is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall, when in a position to do so, intercede to prevent the use of unreasonable force. An officer who observes another employee use force which exceeds the degree of force permitted by law should promptly report these observations to a SJCO or OIC.

1357.3 USE OF FORCE

Officers shall use only the amount of force which reasonably appears necessary given the facts and circumstances perceived by the officer at the time of the event to accomplish a legitimate law enforcement purpose.

The reasonableness of force will be judged from the perspective of a reasonable officer on the scene at the time of the incident. Any evaluation of reasonableness must allow for the fact officers are often forced to make split-second decisions about the amount of force which reasonably appears necessary in a particular situation, with limited information and in circumstances which are tense, uncertain and rapidly evolving.

Given no policy can realistically predict every possible situation an officer might encounter; officers are entrusted to use well-reasoned discretion in determining the appropriate use of force in each incident. It is also recognized the circumstances may arise in which officers reasonably believe it would be impractical or ineffective to use any of the tools, or methods provided by the Department. Officers may find it more effective or reasonable to improvise their response to rapidly unfolding conditions they are confronting. In such circumstances, the use of any improvised device or method must nonetheless be reasonable and utilized only to the degree which reasonably appears necessary to accomplish a legitimate law enforcement purpose.

While the ultimate objective of every law enforcement encounter is to avoid or minimize injury, nothing in this policy requires an officer to retreat or be exposed to possible physical injury before applying reasonable force.

1357.3.1 USE OF FORCE TO AFFECT AN ARREST

Any peace officer may use reasonable force to affect an arrest, to prevent escape or to overcome resistance. A peace officer who makes or attempts to make an arrest need not retreat or desist from his/her efforts by reason of resistance or threatened resistance on the part of the person being arrested; nor shall an officer be deemed the aggressor or lose his/her right to self-defense by the use of reasonable force to effect the arrest, prevent escape or to overcome resistance (Penal Code § 835).

1357.3.2 FACTORS USED TO DETERMINE THE REASONABLENESS OF FORCE

When determining whether to apply force and evaluating whether an officer has used reasonable force, a number of factors should be taken into consideration, as time and circumstances permit.

These factors include, but are not limited to:

- (a) Immediacy and severity of the threat to officers or others.
- (b) The conduct of the individual being confronted, as reasonably perceived by the officer at the time.
- (c) Officer/subject factors (age, size, relative strength, skill level, injuries sustained, level of exhaustion or fatigue, and the number of officers available vs. subjects).
- (d) The effects of drugs or alcohol.
- (e) Subject's mental state or capacity.
- (f) Proximity of weapons or dangerous improvised devices.
- (g) The degree to which the subject has been effectively restrained and his/her ability to resist despite being restrained.
- (h) The availability of other options and their possible effectiveness.
- (i) Seriousness of the suspected offense or reason for contact with the individual.
- (j) Training and experience of the officer.
- (k) Potential for injury to officers, suspects and others.
- (l) Any known medical conditions which could contradict the appropriateness or effectiveness of the level of applied force.
- (m) Whether the person appears to be resisting, attempting to evade arrest by flight or is attacking the officer.
- (n) The risk and reasonably foreseeable consequences of escape.
- (o) The apparent need for immediate control of the subject or a prompt resolution of the situation.
- (p) Whether the conduct of the individual being confronted no longer reasonably appears to pose an imminent threat to the officer or others.
- (q) Prior contacts with the subject or awareness of any propensity for violence.
- (r) Any other exigent circumstances.

When to request additional assistance:

- (1) Whenever it is anticipated physical force may be utilized, more than one staff should be present.
- (2) Unless circumstances prevent, additional staff should be summoned before initiating physical force.

No person who is known to be pregnant, in labor, delivery or recovery after delivery shall be handcuffed or restrained except in extraordinary circumstances and only when a SJCO or OIC makes an individualized determination such restraints are necessary for the safety of the arrestee, officers or others (Penal Code § 3407; Penal Code § 60301; Welfare and Institutions Code § 222).

1357.3.3 PAIN COMPLIANCE TECHNIQUES

Pain compliance techniques may be effective in controlling a physically, actively or passively resisting individual. Officer may only apply those pain compliance techniques for which they have successfully completed department-approved training. Officers utilizing any pain compliance technique should consider:

- (a) The degree to which the application of the technique may be controlled given the level of resistance.
- (b) Whether the person can comply with the direction or orders of the officer.
- (c) Whether the person has been given sufficient opportunity to comply.

The application of any pain compliance technique shall be discontinued once the officer determines compliance has been achieved.

1357.4 Force options:

The listing below is not to be construed as meaning the authorized force options available are to be used only in the order listed. Staff shall escalate or de-escalate their use of force based on the totality of the circumstances and, whenever reasonably able to do so, take into consideration the criteria outlined in Section 1357.3.2.

- (a) Reputation/Physical Presence:

Both reputation and physical presence are the first and most often used options for the maintenance of good institutional control and the prevention of situations requiring physical intervention. This option is defined as the effect staff's demonstrated honesty, professionalism, integrity, pride and reputation for fairness has on a youth's behavior. Rapport, cooperation and respect are also necessary ingredients. These characteristics, to be effective, must be consistently maintained. Staff's non-verbal behavior will reinforce group control.

- (b) Dialogue/Counseling/Verbal Commands:

Dialogue refers to a staff member's ability to engage a youth in conversation, which will result in a de-escalation of defiance. Counseling refers to the ability to use dialogue or two-way communication to gain control of a situation through reasoning, rapport and insight. Counseling is intended to provide staff with information necessary to de-escalate a youth's emotional condition.

- (c) Empty Hands/Weaponless Control Techniques:

Empty hand restraint or weaponless control techniques involve a staff's use of the various self-defense, physical restraint control techniques and compliance holds taught in the Juvenile Correctional Officer Core Course curriculum and/or techniques learned during training authorized by the Yuba County Probation Department. Staff is to utilize only those defensive and restraint holds approved and taught to them.

- (d) Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) pepper spray:

See Policy Section 1357.13.

- (e) Improvised Weapons

Improvised weapons are objects of opportunity which shall only be used given exigent circumstances. They shall only be used for the prevention or intervention of great bodily injury or death.

1357.5 REPORTING THE USE OF FORCE

Any use of force by a member of this department shall be documented promptly, completely and accurately in an appropriate report in accordance with Policy Manual Section 1362. The officer should articulate the factors perceived and why he/she believed the use of force was reasonable under the circumstances. To collect data for purposes of training, resource allocation, analysis and related purposes, the Department may require the completion of additional report forms, as specified in department policy, procedure or law.

1357.5.1 NOTIFICATION TO SJCO or OIC

Supervisory notification shall be made as soon as practicable following the application of force in any and all circumstances involving Empty Hands/Weaponless Control Techniques and OC pepper spray.

1357.6 SJCO or OIC RESPONSIBILITY

When a SJCO or OIC is able to respond to an incident in which there has been a reported application of force, the SJCO or OIC is expected to:

- (a) Obtain the basic facts from the involved officers. Absent an allegation of misconduct or excessive force, this will be considered a routine contact in the normal course of duties.
- (b) Ensure any injured parties are examined and treated.
- (c) When possible, separately obtain a recorded interview with the subject upon whom force was applied. If this interview is conducted without the person having voluntarily waived his/her Miranda rights, the following shall apply:
 - 1. The content of the interview should not be summarized or included in any related criminal charges.
 - 2. The fact a recorded interview was conducted should be documented in a property or other report.
- (d) The recording of the interview should be distinctly marked for retention until all potential for civil litigation has expired. Once any initial medical assessment has been completed or first aid has been rendered, ensure photographs have been taken of any areas involving visible injury or complaint of pain, as well as overall photographs of uninjured areas. These photographs should be retained until all potential for civil litigation has expired.

- (e) Identify any witnesses not already included in related reports.
- (f) Review and approve all related reports.
- (g) Determine if there is any indication the subject may pursue civil litigation. If there is an indication of potential civil litigation, the SJCO or OIC should complete and route a notification of a potential claim through the appropriate channels.
- (h) Evaluate the circumstances surrounding the incident and initiate an administrative investigation if there is a question of policy non-compliance or if for any reason further investigation may be appropriate.

In the event a SJCO or OIC is unable to respond to the scene of an incident involving the reported application of force, the SJCO or OIC is still expected to complete as many of the above items as circumstances permit.

1357.6.1 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT RESPONSIBILITY

The Deputy Superintendent shall review each use of force by any personnel within his/her command to ensure compliance with this policy and to address any training issues.

1357.7 TRAINING

Officers will receive periodic training on this policy and demonstrate their knowledge and understanding.

1357.8 CONTROL DEVICES and TECHNIQUES

This policy provides guidelines for the use and maintenance of control devices. Control Devices are use of force tools authorized by the Department for use by staff. The Control Device authorized by the Department in the Institution is OLEORESIN CAPSICUM (OC) spray.

1357.9 POLICY

In order to control subjects who are violent or who demonstrate the intent to be violent, the Yuba County Probation Department authorizes officers to use control devices in accordance with the guidelines in this policy and the Use of Force Policy.

1357.10 ISSUING, CARRYING AND USING CONTROL DEVICES

Control devices described in this policy may be carried and used by members of this department only if the device has been issued by the Department or approved by the Chief Probation Officer or the authorized designee.

Only officers who have successfully completed department-approved training in the use of any control device are authorized to carry and use the device.

Control devices may be used when a decision has been made to control, restrain or arrest a subject who is violent or who demonstrates the intent to be violent and the use of the device

appears reasonable under the circumstances. When reasonable, a verbal warning and opportunity to comply should precede the use of these devices.

When using control devices, officers should carefully consider potential impact areas in order to minimize injuries and unintentional targets.

1357.11 RESPONSIBILITIES

1357.11.1 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

The Deputy Superintendent may authorize the use of a control device by selected personnel or members of specialized units who have successfully completed the required training.

1357.11.2 SJCO OR OIC RESPONSIBILITIES

SJCO or OIC shall control the inventory and issuance of all control devices and shall ensure all damaged, inoperative, outdated or expended control devices are properly disposed of, repaired or replaced.

Every control device will be periodically inspected by the SJCO, OIC, or the designated instructor for a particular control device. The inspection shall be documented.

1357.11.3 USER RESPONSIBILITIES

All normal maintenance, charging or cleaning shall remain the responsibility of personnel using the various devices.

1357.12 OLEORESIN CAPSICUM (OC) GUIDELINES

Advisement: The regulations set forth in this section and the use of Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) pepper spray herein authorized, comprise the limits established by the California Penal Code and Chief Probation Officer. Any employee who fails to comply with these regulations may be subject to disciplinary action, unless the employee can adequately justify the action taken was legal, safe, and necessary. The burden of such justification is on the employee.

As with other control devices, OC spray may be considered for use to bring under control an individual or groups of individuals who are engaging in, or are about to engage in violent behavior. OC spray should not, however, be used against individuals or groups who merely fail to disperse or do not reasonably appear to present a risk to the safety of officers or the public.

OC spray is authorized for use by officers with approval of the Chief Probation Officer. All officers are required to receive chemical agent training prior to carrying/using chemical agents. All officers will carry the OC spray provided by the Department. No other brand or type of chemical agent is authorized for duty use.

OC spray should be applied to subject(s) from distances not less than 3 feet or more than 12 feet. Use of OC spray at close distances should be performed only under extreme conditions.

1. The discharges of OC spray should be directed at the eyes and face of the subject.
2. The duration of the application of OC spray should be 1 or 2 one-second burst(s) aimed directly at the face and eyes of the subject. The amount of OC spray used shall be limited to the amount required to effectively control the subject. Generally, the effects of OC spray will last 15 to 45 minutes.
3. OC spray does not vaporize and officers should wait a few seconds before handling subjects.
4. Animals: OC spray is also effective on animals. It should be considered for use on vicious animals.
5. OC spray shall not be used on a person when their behavior is no longer likely to cause injury, property damage or escape.

1357.12.1 YOUTH'S ADVISEMENT:

Every youth will receive information regarding the facilities use of OC pepper spray, during the booking process. This advisement will consist of a verbal explanation of behavior which may result in the use of pepper spray. The youth will also be provided with an orientation manual which will include information on OC.

1357.12.2 NOTIFICATION:

Notification of OC pepper spray use within the Institution shall be posted in the living units where OC spray may be deployed. The notification will be posted in a conspicuous area so youth and parents can read. (See Notification in Appendix A - Forms)

1357.12.3 AUTHORIZATION:

The Chief Probation Officer authorizes the use of OC pepper spray to include the Superintendent of Institutions, Deputy Superintendent, SJCO, JCO, and Extra Help JCO, with the satisfactory completion of the following conditions:

- (a) Completion of 832 P.C. Training.
- (b) Completion of a S.T.C. certified OC course.
- (c) Attest to reading and understanding juvenile institution's policy regarding conditions for the use of OC pepper spray by signing an acknowledgment form. This signed form shall become part of the employee's permanent training file.
- (d) Completion of CPR and First-Aid training.
- (e) Be on duty and authorized by the Superintendent of Institutions or Deputy Superintendent to possess and use OC pepper spray.

1357.13 CHARACTERISTICS OF OC:

Oleoresin Capsicum is considered "Tear Gas" as defined by Penal Code Section 22810. OC when applied to the face, typically causes swelling of the mucous membranes, involuntary closing of the eyes, gagging, coughing, shortness of breath, and an intense feeling of burning on the exposed skin areas. Most individuals encountering OC involuntarily bend at the waist or drop to their knees, regardless of their emotional or intoxicated state. The symptoms caused by OC are temporary and may last up to 45 minutes if left untreated. With treatment, the effects can dissipate within 15 to 20 minutes. Decontamination is simpler and more effective than with other chemical agents.

1357.13.1 GENERAL PRECAUTIONS: The following precautions shall be strictly adhered to with regard to the operation of OC:

- (a) Care shall be given before using OC in windy conditions, e.g., outside recreation.
- (b) Care shall be taken as to the type of OC dispenser and its mode of carry to preclude accidental discharge.
- (c) OC shall not be used in the vicinity of infants since their respiratory systems are extremely sensitive.
- (d) Staff shall check the OC dispenser to ensure there is an adequate supply of OC remaining (the dispenser should be replaced when less than 1/3 of the contents remain).
- (e) OC dispensers should be tested every three months to confirm the spray nozzle is clear and dispenser is functioning properly. This test will be performed in a manner consistent with policy, which addresses discharging OC for the purpose of performing operation verification.
- (f) OC shall consist of a non-flammable/non-toxic composition. Contents are noted on the side of the OC dispenser.
- (g) Under no circumstance is staff to take OC pepper spray out of Institution when they are off duty.
- (h) Authorized staff on each shift shall carry OC pepper spray in an appropriate secure carrier.
- (i) Only OC issued by the department is to be used or carried on the premises (no personal spray allowed).
- (j) No personal use of OC will be permitted.
- (k) OC dispensers shall be locked in a secure area of the Control Room when not in use.

- (l) The SJCO or OIC shall ensure each OC dispenser is accounted for at the end of the shift.
- (m) When possible, staff should avoid deploying OC against youth which have been assigned to an "M" classification and/or have the following medical histories:
 - (1) Respiratory problems.
 - (2) Heart disease or related problems.
 - (3) Seizures.
 - (4) Under the influence of stimulants (e.g., cocaine, methamphetamine, PCP).
 - (5) Taking psychotropic or stimulate medications.
 - (6) Medically obese.
 - (7) Pregnancy

NOTE: Use or discharge of OC pepper spray not in accordance with this policy is unauthorized. Violation of this policy may result in disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment.

1357.14 DECONTAMINATION AND FOLLOW-UP:

OC spray is an organic inflammatory agent and will cause the eyes to involuntarily close. The subject will also experience extreme burning to the face and eyes. OC spray will inflame the soft tissue in the eyes, nose and throat. This may cause a sense of difficulty in breathing and panic in the subject. The Officer should reassure the subject the effects are temporary and attempt to calm the subject.

Officers will ensure the subject receives adequate decontamination treatment as soon as possible. Officers should or apply large amounts of running water to the face and eyes of the subject until relief is felt. No creams or salves should be used. If decontamination treatment fails to bring relief after a reasonable amount of time, arrangements are to be made to provide the subject with medical care. Infants and small children inadvertently sprayed with OC spray should be taken to a medical facility for treatment.

1357.14.1 OC DECONTAMINATION PROCEDURES: In all cases where OC is deployed and the youth has been controlled, the youth shall be immediately removed to an area where the decontamination process will take place. All youth affected by OC spray shall be referred to medical staff.

The following procedures shall be used to decontaminate individuals affected by OC spray:

- (a) Staff shall assist each youth affected by OC during the decontamination process. Verbally reassure the youth, tell them to calm down and try to breathe normally. Explain the effects of the spray are only temporary and will diminish within a short period. All symptoms should disappear within 15 to 45 minutes without after effects.

IMPORTANT: Normal breathing should return in a matter of minutes. If the youth has serious difficulty breathing, staff should acquire immediate medical attention.

- (b) Staff shall move the affected youth to the shower area or booking room. An outdoor hose may be used if the incident occurs outside.
- (c) When the decontamination begins, youth wearing contact lenses should remove them. Medical staff may advise or assist in the removal of the contact lenses.
- (d) The youth should be placed in the shower, fully clothed, and a cool stream of water allowed to run over the youth's face and head. Staff should encourage the youth to flush their eyes and face with the cool water.
- (e) Staff may need to explain to the youth using warm water or soap is not advised. Warm water opens the skin's pores increasing discomfort and using soap or cream-based products will trap the irritants, enhancing and prolonging the discomfort.

NOTE: If a shower is not available, have the youth lean over a sink and apply cool water, flushing the youth's eyes and faces. An alternative method would be to spray the youth's face with water using a mister and applying air using a battery operated or electric fan.

- (f) Remove all contaminated clothing and allow the affected individual to shower without soap or any oil-based product. The youth should not rub their face or eyes, but may pat face dry with a towel.
- (g) Clean clothing shall be issued.
- (h) All youth sprayed with OC shall be referred to medical.
- (i) Five (5) minute room checks shall be completed by staff for one (1) hour beginning from the end of the decontamination shower.
- (j) All contaminated areas, (e.g., floors, counter tops, walls, mattresses) will be thoroughly cleaned with soap and water.
- (k) Document incident.

1357.14.2 STAFF CONTAMINATION FROM OC: After youth and the Institution are secured, staff will notify the SJCO or OIC if they have received an over spray or are having a reaction from the OC spray. The SJCO or OIC will make a determination regarding the condition of the affected staff and take the appropriate action as outlined below:

- (a) The SJCO or OIC will determine if it is necessary to allow the staff to have time off the floor to recover.
- (b) If the staff has received a direct spray or is suffering from a severe reaction from OC over spray the following protocol will be utilized:
 - (1) Staff will undergo the same decontamination process outlined for youth.

- (2) The SJCO or OIC will follow the policy for staff injuries pursuant to manual section 1323.6, Staff Injuries.

1357.14.3 DOCUMENTATION: The threat, un-holstering, and/or use of OC shall be reported on an incident report (SIR) in accordance with Title 15, Section 1362. The incident report shall be completed prior to the end of the shift, which the use of OC spray occurred. The Deputy Superintendent shall review the reports to ensure the use of OC was in accordance with this policy. The incident report shall include the following.

- (a) A clear and factual justification for the use of restraint.
- (b) A description of how the OC was utilized and the response of the subject(s) sprayed.
- (c) A complete description of decontamination procedures and medical treatment/referral

1357.15 CONTROL AND ISSUANCE OF OC SPRAY:

- 1. Officers are responsible for the OC spray equipment issued to them and are not permitted to loan or give this restricted equipment to anyone other than authorized officers.
- 2. Malfunctioning or empty canisters are to be turned in to the Deputy Superintendent for safe and proper disposal. Replacement will be made upon receipt of old equipment.
- 3. Theft or loss of this equipment shall be reported immediately to a SJCO or OIC.
- 4. Serial numbers and other marks of identification on the chemical agent canisters are required. No personnel shall remove any label or mark of identification from any such container.

MAINTENANCE AND CARE: Officers should test canisters every three months to ensure they are functioning properly.

1357.16 OC SPRAY

Officers carrying OC spray shall carry the device in its authorized holster on the equipment belt.

1357.17 TREATMENT FOR OC SPRAY EXPOSURE

Persons who have been sprayed with or otherwise affected by the use of OC should be promptly provided with clean water to cleanse the affected areas. Those persons who complain of further severe effects shall be examined by appropriate medical personnel.

Control Devices and Techniques

303.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides guidelines for the use and maintenance of control devices that are described in this policy.

303.2 POLICY

In order to control subjects who are violent or who demonstrate the intent to be violent, the Yuba County Probation Department authorizes officers to use control devices in accordance with the guidelines in this policy and the Use of Force Policy.

303.3 ISSUING, CARRYING AND USING CONTROL DEVICES

Control devices described in this policy may be carried and used by members of this department only if the device has been issued by the Department or approved by the Chief Probation Officer or the authorized designee.

Only officers who have successfully completed department-approved training in the use of any control device are authorized to carry and use the device.

Control devices may be used when a decision has been made to control, restrain or arrest a subject who is violent or who demonstrates the intent to be violent, and the use of the device appears reasonable under the circumstances. When reasonable, a verbal warning and opportunity to comply should precede the use of these devices.

When using control devices, officers should carefully consider potential impact areas in order to minimize injuries and unintentional targets.

303.4 RESPONSIBILITIES

303.4.1 PROBATION PROGRAM MANAGER RESPONSIBILITIES

The Probation Program Manager may authorize the use of a control device by selected personnel or members of specialized units who have successfully completed the required training.

303.4.2 EQUIPMENT OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES

The Equipment Officer shall control the inventory and issuance of all control devices and shall ensure that all damaged, inoperative, outdated or expended control devices or munitions are properly disposed of, repaired or replaced.

Every control device will be periodically inspected by the Equipment Officer or the designated instructor for a particular control device. The inspection shall be documented.

303.4.3 USER RESPONSIBILITIES

All normal maintenance, charging or cleaning shall remain the responsibility of personnel using the various devices.

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Control Devices and Techniques

Any damaged, inoperative, outdated or expended control devices or munitions, along with documentation explaining the cause of the damage, shall be returned to the Rangemaster for disposition. Damage to County property forms shall also be prepared and forwarded through the chain of command, when appropriate, explaining the cause of damage.

303.5 IMPACT WEAPON GUIDELINES

The need to immediately control a suspect must be weighed against the risk of causing serious injury. The head, neck, throat, spine, heart, kidneys and groin should not be intentionally targeted except when the officer reasonably believes the suspect poses an imminent threat of serious bodily injury or death to the officer or others.

When carrying a impact weapon, uniformed personnel shall carry the impact weapon in its authorized holder. Plainclothes and non-field personnel may carry the baton as authorized and in accordance with the needs of their assignment or at the direction of their supervisor. The authorized holder shall be approved by the impact weapon instructor.

303.6 OLEORESIN CAPSICUM (OC) GUIDELINES

As with other control devices, oleoresin capsicum (OC) spray may be considered for use to bring under control an individual or groups of individuals who are engaging in, or are about to engage in violent behavior. OC spray should not, however, be used against individuals or groups who merely fail to disperse or do not reasonably appear to present a risk to the safety of officers or the public.

OC spray is authorized for use by officers with approval of the Chief Probation Officer. All officer are required to receive chemical agent training prior to carrying/using chemical agents. All officer will carry the OC spray provided by the Department. No other brand or type of chemical agent is authorized for duty use.

OC spray should be applied to subject(s) from distances not less than 3 feet or more than 12 feet. Use of OC spray at close distances should be performed only under extreme conditions.

1. The discharges of OC spray should be directed at the eyes and face of the subject.

CONTROL AND ISSUANCE OF OC SPRAY:

1. Officers are responsible for the OC spray equipment issued to them and are not permitted to loan or give this restricted equipment to anyone other than authorized officers.
2. Malfunctioning or empty canisters are to be turned in to the Equipment Officer for safe and proper disposal. Replacement will be made upon receipt of old equipment.
3. Theft or loss of this equipment shall be reported immediately to your supervisor.
4. Serial numbers and other marks of identification on the chemical agent canisters are required. No personnel shall remove any label or mark of identification from any such container.

MAINTENANCE AND CARE: Officers should test canisters every three months to ensure that they are functioning properly.

303.6.1 OC SPRAY

Field personnel carrying OC spray shall carry the device in its authorized holster on the equipment belt. Plainclothes and non-field personnel may carry OC spray as authorized, in accordance with the needs of their assignment or at the direction of their supervisor.

303.6.2 TREATMENT FOR OC SPRAY EXPOSURE

Persons who have been sprayed with or otherwise affected by the use of OC should be promptly provided with clean water to cleanse the affected areas. Those persons who complain of further severe effects shall be examined by appropriate medical personnel.

303.7 POST-APPLICATION NOTICE

Whenever OC has been introduced into a residence, building interior, vehicle or other enclosed area, officers should provide the owners or available occupants with notice of the possible

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presence of residue that could result in irritation or injury if the area is not properly cleaned. Such notice should include advisement that clean up will be at the owner's expense. Information regarding the method of notice and the individuals notified should be included in related reports.

303.8 TRAINING FOR CONTROL DEVICES

The Training Manager shall ensure that all personnel who are authorized to carry a control device have been properly trained and certified to carry the specific control device and are retrained or recertified as necessary.

- (a) Proficiency training shall be monitored and documented by a certified, control-device weapons, tactics instructor or Training Manager.
- (b) All training and proficiency for control devices will be documented in the officer's training file.
- (c) Officers who fail to demonstrate proficiency with the control device or knowledge of this agency's Use of Force Policy will be provided remedial training. If an officer cannot demonstrate proficiency with a control device or knowledge of this agency's Use of Force Policy after remedial training, the officer will be restricted from carrying the control device and may be subject to discipline.

303.9 REPORTING USE OF CONTROL DEVICES AND TECHNIQUES

Any application of a control device or technique listed in this policy shall be documented in the related incident report and reported pursuant to the Use of Force Policy.

Oleoresin Capsicum

Carrying Canisters

Officers may carry OC on duty, if they have completed BJJ/OC training course, CPR certification and have demonstrated understanding of the 10-County Juvenile Hall policy as it relates to OC.

Can be carried concealed or in a visible carrying case.
Should be accessible when needed.
Avoid exposure to extreme heat or cold.
As holster/secure canister quickly after use.
Empty canisters can be discarded in garbage can as long as it is not incinerated.

Physiological and Psychological Effects:

Common symptoms include burning of eyes, skin and respiratory system.
Copious tearing.
Involuntary closing of the eyes- they may start to shut.
Swelling in the lining of the throat.
Reduced airway.
Temporary paralysis of the tongue.
Uncontrollable sneezing, gagging, or grasping for breath.
Inflammation of the skin, similar to a burn, could become acute.

The burning is intensified by water. Water is your friend. It may not feel like it, but it is your friend.

Probation Notes

Officers are responsible for the care of their canister.

You are not allowed to loan your canister to anyone other than authorized officers.

Malfunctioning or empty canisters should be returned to the equipment officer for replacement.

Theft or loss of equipment should be reported immediately to your supervisor.

Serial numbers and other marks of identification must be legible. Do not remove them.

Officers should test each canister every 3 months to ensure they are working properly.
Field personnel carrying OC shall carry the device in an approved holster on an equipment belt or vest.

Plain clothes and non-field officers may carry OC spray as authorized in accordance with policy.

OC spray may not be used to disperse a crowd unless there is an immediate risk of safety to officers or public.

History of Use:

The first use of chemical agents was in China. They used "Sink Pots" to throw at the enemy. The "Sink Pots" contained a mixture of boiling oil and peppers.

The first use "Pepper Spray" in Law Enforcement was in 1917, when the French used a substance close to CN in handbombs.

1932 First use of Pepper Spray by the FBI.
1937 FBI began testing O.C.
1950 FBI approved agents to carry Pepper Spray.
1991 OC became available from multiple companies.
1994 OC became available over the counter.
1996 OC approved for use in California.

Delivery methods: Projectile, Aerosol, and Grenade.

We use the hand held Aerosol canister. They come in different sizes, we use the 3 oz. size.

Classification: Inflammatory Agent.
Essence of Cayenne or Chili peppers.
Color is orange.

Deployment:

May be used in controlling incidents of self defense, defense of others, or if less restrictive means have failed.

Create distance – but remember the limitations of the spray, 6 to 8 feet is ideal but up to 12 feet creation of distance shows a level of "Good Faith". It may allow for the situation to be resolved without deployment.

It will also require the subject to take overt aggressive action in order to injure you.

Call for assistance.

Announce: "Stop or I'll Spray" or "OC".

Aim at the subject's face.

Spray a 3 second burst.

Evaluate for effectiveness. Move laterally to avoid potential attack by subject.

Deploy again if needed. (missed first shot or minimal exposure).

Do not deploy again if effectively deployed. OC is not 100% effective.

Be prepared to take other action.

Stay focused and remain in control until the subject is fully controlled.

Do not expect OC to work immediately or completely.

OC is effective on kids.

First Aid:

Fresh air, have the subject face into the wind.

Free flowing water, use cool water if possible.

Do not use creams or ointments as these will create a film and keep the OC from washing off.

Recovery time is approximately 45-60 minutes. Normal breathing should return in a few minutes.

Do not leave the subject alone until they are completely recovered.

Check the subject for Orange residue.

Once subject is restrained, sit them in an upright position to assist with breathing normally.

Decontamination:

Immediately remove the youth to an area where Decontamination will occur.

Shower area, Booking room, or outside hose.

Youth should remove contact lenses if they wear them.

Youth should be placed in the shower completely clothed, once effects of OC are under control, have the youth remove contaminated clothing and finish shower.

Cool water should run over the youth's face and head (not water flow down back).

Encourage the youth to flush their eyes with the cool water. Advise the youth not to rub their eyes.

Advise the youth, the use of warm water or soap will cause the effects to worsen.

Issue clean clothes.

Factors affecting the use of OC

Metamorphical

Wind and rain may cause the agent to blow back.

Green Area:

Physical and emotional state of subject.
Surrounding area: presence of children or elderly and officer safety.

Remember to remain calm and be prepared to take action.

Possible reasons why OC did not work:

Subject is Drunk, Dehydrated, on Drugs, has a high tolerance of pain, emotional mind set, and degree of exposure.

Deployment Continued

Keep your fellow officers safe: watch for cross contamination or subject to over come the effects.

Be aware of the threat: a youth ripping up a magazine or pillow case if different than breaking a food tray.

Additional staff should be present before deploying OC if possible.

Do not make threats of using OC – it should not be used for punishment, retaliation, or discipline. When applying Physical Intervention, Staff should not allow emotion or anger to cause loss of control.

Do not use OC if the subject's behavior is no longer likely to cause injury, property damage, or escape.

Documentation of OC is necessary if Staff:

Threatens to deploy but does not deploy.

Unholster OC canister but does not deploy.

Deploy OC.

Remember : Aim for the face

Decontamination Continued

Do not leave the youth alone until after the decontamination shower is complete.

Once youth is placed back in their room, a 5-minute medical watch shall begin. Staff shall obtain verbal affirmation from the youth stating they feel well being.

This 5-minute medical watch will continue for at least 1 hour. Youth should be encouraged to sit upright as to ease in breathing.

All contaminated areas shall be cleaned with soap and water.

Documentation:

What gave rise to the incident?
 What were the subject's actions?
 Be specific of statements
 What was your response?
 What attempts were made to de-escalate the situation?
 How did the subject respond to your attempts?
 What steps were taken to control the subject?
 How was Pepper Spray deployed?
 Document all tactics and their effectiveness
 What steps were taken once the subject was controlled?
 Be sure to include discontinuous direct
 Referral to medical staff and 5 minute watch
 Remember: Use of Force is the responsibility of the employee

Alternative Uses of Force:

Use of reputation, appearance, dialogue, or countering
 Utilize command presence
 Show of force. Request assistance from additional staff members
 Empty hands/ weapons techniques
 Pepper Spray
 Mechanical Restraints

Staff should use the force option as it correlates to the youth's escalation of misbehavior.
 Evaluation of a situation and detection of possible aggressive behavior can result in intervention

Oleoresin Capsicum Review Training

Objectives of this training:

1. To review the history behind the approval of chemical weapons
2. To review the effects of O.C. spray
3. To review the factors affecting the use of O.C.
4. To review the departments policy on use of force including O.C.
5. To review the decontamination process after a deployment
6. To review the documentation process after a deployment
7. To inform staff of issues pertaining to officer safety
8. To update staff on Legal issues concerning O.C. spray
9. To offer situations where techniques can be practiced.
10. To discuss situations where O.C. was or should have been deployed.

History of Chemical agents:

1. First recorded use of Chemical agents was in China. They used boiling oil and a pepper solution to create a suffocating smoke.
2. During the Civil War soldiers burned wood soaked in pitch and sulfur.
3. The French police used a substance close to CN (tear gas) in 1912. This was deployed by using a hand bomb which created a gas when exposed to air.
4. The FBI began thinking about using O.C. in 1982.
5. In 1987, they began testing O.C. for possible use by agents.
6. In, 1990 FBI approved O.C. for use by field agents.
7. In 1991, multiple companies began to distribute O.C. products.
8. In 1994, O.C. spray became available over the counter.
9. In 1996, O.C. was approved by the state of California.

The effects of O.C. spray:

1. Involuntary closing of the eyes. (slam shut)
2. Copious tearing
3. Swelling of the lining of the throat
 - a. Reduced airway
 - b. Temporary paralysis of larynx
 - c. Uncontrollable choking, gagging, of grasping for breath.
 - d. Burning a swelling of the mucous membranes.
 - e. Inflammation of the skin
 - i. Similar to a burn
 - ii. Intensified by moisture.

The factors that will affect the use of O.C.

1. Weather conditions
 - a. Wind direction
 - b. Rain
2. Physical and emotional state of the target
3. Officers around for back-up
4. Surrounding area
5. Indoors or Outdoors
6. Shared space with Camp
7. Canister – clean and operational
8. Special visits – infants or elderly

Policy for use of force:

When is physical force appropriate:

1. In self defense
2. In defense of another
3. To prevent an escape
4. To protect a detainee from self-inflicted injuries or suicide
5. To maintain necessary control of a detainee.

The type of restraint shall be determined by the detainee's level of cooperation.

Staff members should remember to remain composed, do not allow anger or emotions to dictate how you utilize your use of force. Verbal abuse or use of force as punishment will not be allowed. Physical force should never be used in situations where reputation and counseling could gain compliance.

Request assistance whenever you may need to apply a form of use of force. Unless circumstances prevent it, additional staff should be summoned before engaging a minor physically.

Unauthorized restraints:

1. Choke holds
2. Kicking
3. Hog-tying
4. Any technique learned outside of departmental or core training.

The 5 steps to control:

1. Reputation
2. Dialogue/counseling
3. Empty hands/ weaponless control
4. Pepper spray
5. Mechanical Restraints/handcuffs

Use of O.C. within the Yuba Sutter Juvenile Hall:

Any employee who exceeds these limitations or fails to comply with these regulations shall be subject to disciplinary action, unless the employee can adequately justify that the action taken was legal, safe and necessary. **The burden of such justification is on the employee.**

Minors will receive information regarding the use of Pepper Spray during the booking process. Notifications shall be posted in the living units advising the minors and visitors that staff members have the authority to deploy O.C. as a method of self-defense and control.

Authorization to carry O.C. comes from the C.P.O. after a group counselor has completed

1. 832 P.C. training
2. Completion of a S.T.C. certified O.C. course
3. Read and understands the J.H. policy regarding use of O.C.
4. Is on duty.

Care and control of O.C. canisters:

1. O.C. canisters are to be stored in a locked cabinet in the control room. The on-coming SGC will advise the CRO of the correct number and location of all the cans of O.C.
2. Each Full-time on duty officer, who meets the requirements for authorization, will carry O.C., in an approved holster, while on duty.
3. Under no circumstances is O.C. to be left unattended, taken outside of the facility, stored in vehicles, or used for personal use.
4. No personal O.C. may be carried while on duty, only the approved O.C. issued by the department will be carried.
5. Cans will be removed from service if they are determined to be less than 1/3 full.

Criteria for use of O.C. Spray:

Before O.C. spray can be used, consideration must first be given to the gravity of the situation. Clear and present danger of injury to persons or property, or aggressive/hostile behavior is present. It will not be used in anticipation of a threat.

O.C. spray may be used in the following situations:

1. When confronted with a physically violent, combative minor or group of minors, whose behavior would cause a reasonable person to believe that this action, threat of action, may result in bodily harm to staff or others.
2. When an overt aggressive action, threats of overt aggressive action which would cause a reasonable person to believe that without action, the circumstances may result in harm to a staff member or others.
3. When less restrictive methods of the force options have failed or when the circumstances would cause a reasonable person to believe that the other methods would pose an immediate threat of, or may result in, bodily harm to staff or others.

Decontamination of minor after deployment of O.C.

1. Immediately remove the minor to an area where decontamination will occur.
 - a. Shower area
 - b. Booking room
 - c. Outside hose
2. If the minor wears contact lens, have them remove them as soon as possible
3. Place the minor in the shower completely clothed. The decontamination shower should be at least 20 mins. long. The new cans of O.C. are hotter and therefore will require a longer shower.
4. Allow cool water to run over the minors face and head. Verbally direct the minor to tilt head backwards to allow the water to run down their back.
5. Encourage the minor to flush their eyes and face
6. Advise the minor that soap will only make the situation worse by opening pores and creating a film, which will hold the pepper spray on their skin.
7. If a shower is not readily available, have the minor lean over a sink and flush their face and eyes.
8. Do not allow the minor to rub their eyes but advise them to pat dry their face.
9. Issue them clean clothes
10. If the minor is having trouble breathing, allow them to sit in an upright position to assist with breathing normally.
11. **Do Not** leave them alone until the effects of the O.C. have disappeared.

Once the minor has been decontaminated, place them in their room and begin a 5-min watch for a period of at least 1-hr. During this time, staff members will observe the minor in an upright position and get verbal confirmation from the minor that they are not having any lasting effects from the spray.

All contaminated areas will be cleaned with soap and water.

Documentation of threat, unholstering, or deployment of O.C.

1. What gave rise to the incident
2. What were the subjects actions
3. What was your response? Attempts to diffuse the situation.
4. How did the subject respond to your attempts to deescalate the situation
5. What steps were taken to control the subject
6. How did the subject respond to your actions
7. What happened after you had the subject controlled.

Things to remember when documenting an incident:

1. Specific commands given
2. Specific responses by the minor
3. Support staff's involvement
4. Over-spray on others
5. Missed shots due to moving target

Legal issues:

1. Intended effects of using chemical agents
 - a. Distract
 - b. Disorient
 - c. Disrupt
 - d. Disable
2. Use of Excessive force, or quantities of chemical, which exceed the required amount to control the situation, crosses into the area of punishment.

Deployment of O.C.

1. Create a distance – but remember the limitations of the canister.
2. Call for assistance
3. Announce – “O.C.” or “Stop or I’ll spray”
4. Aim at the subjects face and spray a 1 sec burst of agent. The appropriate target is the subject’s **FACE**.
5. Allow yourself an escape route. Move to the side to avoid possible attack from blinded subject.
6. Restrain the subject to the ground if necessary.
7. Secure the area – crowd control – be aware of by-standers
8. Begin the decontamination process.

Limitations of O.C.

1. O.C. stream has an effective range of 10-12 feet.
2. Do not use O.C. spray within 3 feet of the subject
3. Full cans will spray farther than mini cans will.
